Clerks and Assistant Clerks of Superior Court

Core Classes

Orientation for New Clerks of Superior Court

This program provides orientation for new clerks, emphasizing their roles as managers, supervisors, leaders, financial investors, and judicial officials. By invitation only

TOPICS An overview of clerks' duties, the Conference of Clerks of Superior Court, the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC), financial matters, personnel issues, and organizing an existing office

AUDIENCE New Clerks of Superior Court **SCHEDULE** Every other year for 3–5 days

LEAD FACULTY Meredith Smith

SPONSOR Administrative Office of the Courts and Conference of Clerks of Superior Court

Contested Hearings for Clerks of Superior Court

This course is for clerks who want to feel more confident conducting contested hearings. It includes a lecture, small group work, and a mock hearing.

TOPICS The clerk's judicial authority, hearing procedures, contempt, common evidence problems, drafting an order, legal research and rendering a decision

AUDIENCE Clerks and Assistant Clerks of Superior Court

SCHEDULE Annually for 2 days **LEAD FACULTY** Joseph Laizure

Domestic Violence for Clerks of Superior Court

This introductory training is for clerks with little or no formal training or specialized experience in fields related to domestic violence.

TOPICS The law and procedures governing domestic violence proceedings, dynamics of domestic violence, technology, and the clerk's role

AUDIENCE Clerks, Assistant Clerks, and Deputy Clerks of Superior Court

SCHEDULE Every other year for 1 day **LEAD FACULTY** Brittany Bromell

Foreclosure Hearings for Clerks of Superior Court

This course for clerks covers issues that arise in connection with foreclosure hearings.

AUDIENCE Clerks and Assistant Clerks of Superior Court

Introduction to Estates Administration

This course focuses on the fundamentals of estate administration for clerks new to estates.

TOPICS Essential terminology, the process of opening an estate, the clerk's role in reviewing and compiling inventories and accounts, and closing and settling an estate

AUDIENCE Clerks and Assistant Clerks of Superior Court

SCHEDULE Annually for 2 days **LEAD FACULTY** Catherine Wilson

Partition for Clerks

This course covers the law of partitions and the clerk's judicial role in presiding over partition proceedings.

AUDIENCE Clerks and Assistant Clerks of Superior Court

Trusts and Trust Proceedings for Clerks of Superior Court

This course focuses on the basics of trusts and common issues related to trusts that arise in proceedings before the clerk

TOPICS Trust proceedings, testamentary trusts, the intersection of guardianship and trusts, and special needs trusts

AUDIENCE Clerks and Assistant Clerks of Superior Court

Advanced Classes

Drafting Orders for Clerks

This course is for clerks with experience presiding over hearings. It covers issues related to drafting orders in estate, trust, and power of attorney proceedings.

TOPICS Appellate standards of review, components of an order, evidence, making findings of fact and conclusions of law, attorney-drafted orders, and entry of an order

AUDIENCE Clerks and Assistant Clerks of Superior Court

SCHEDULE Every other year for 2 days
LEAD FACULTY Meredith Smith

Incompetency and Adult Guardianship Hearings

This course covers issues that arise in incompetency and guardianship proceedings. This is for clerks with experience in incompetency and guardianship proceedings or who have previously taken *Essential Skills for New Hearing Clerks: Incompetency Proceedings*, offered through the AOC.

TOPICS The use of limited guardianship, legal representation of the respondent, procedural and evidentiary issues, judicial and medical determination of incapacity, public guardianship, and restoration

AUDIENCE Clerks and Assistant Clerks of Superior Court

SCHEDULE Annually for 3 days **LEAD FACULTY** Meredith Smith

Selected Proceedings Involving Minors Before the Clerk

This course covers selected proceedings and issues involving minors who come before the clerk.

TOPICS Legitimation, minor guardianship, the appointment of a guardian ad litem, and decedent's estates involving minor heirs

AUDIENCE Clerks and Assistant Clerks of Superior Court **SCHEDULE** Every other year for 2 days

Leadership Classes

Building Coaching Skills to Tap Potential for Clerks

A successful supervisor can effectively coach and develop staff to take initiative, resolve conflict, develop productive working relationships, and reach their highest potential. While most supervisors can master the technical aspects of their job, the more challenging part is knowing how to help others develop and flourish, solve their problems, and have tough conversations when things are not going well. This interactive workshop allows participants to practice key skills.

TOPICS The differences between being a coach and a manager; how to develop a coach-like leadership mindset that will help create a more collaborative work environment; a framework for identifying the owner of a problem and skills for coaching conversations; and making the shift from being a "know-it-all" to a "learn-it-all" leader

AUDIENCE Clerks and Assistant Clerks of Superior Court

SCHEDULE Every other year for 1 day

Navigating Difficult Conversations for Clerks

Navigating difficult conversations is a core leadership skill. Healthy conflict allows us to express our ideas and learn more about others' perspectives to develop lasting solutions. Working through conflict can make us stronger, more resilient, and more accepting. This course helps participants find the opportunities for personal and professional growth presented by conflict. It focuses on real-time practice and application with feedback and coaching. Participants will leave already using skills that will effect positive changes in their workplace and community.

Core Classes

Orientation for New District Court Judges

This course provides training and orientation for new district court judges. Participants focus on conducting criminal, civil, and juvenile court proceedings, including ethics issues and various substantive legal topics. By invitation only

and one week in March)

Orientation for New Chief District Court Judges

This course is for judges new to the chief district court judge position and the position of senior resident superior court judge. These groups are combined for portions of the program and meet separately to consider position-specific issues. Part of the program is spent at the Judicial Center in Raleigh to learn more about services provided by the AOC.

TOPICS Administration of the court, including the role of the chief district and senior resident judge, scheduling, performance measures, facilities and court security, case management, human resources, and court leadership

Advanced Classes

Advanced Family Law

This course is intended for judges with experience presiding over child custody or equitable distribution cases. Participants will discuss cases in a small group, interactive setting.

The course will be offered every other year, with the focus of the course alternating between child custody cases and equitable distribution cases.

TOPICS Child custody: jurisdiction issues, the courts' scope of authority in custody cases, creating parenting plans, grandparent and other non-parent custody

claims, determining parentage, and enforcement of custody cases. Equitable Distribution: Marital and divisible property and debt classification, valuation methodologies, trial management techniques, and post-judgment issues

Juvenile Court Certification Classes

Introduction to Juvenile Court Proceedings

This introductory online course provides an overview of general concepts and framework that apply to juvenile proceedings under G.S. Chapter 7B: specifically, abuse, neglect, dependency; termination of parental rights; and delinquency.

TOPICS The concept of juvenile court, why and how juvenile proceedings are different, the importance of G.S. Chapter 7B for substantive and procedural law, the impact on constitutional rights of the parties, managing the juvenile courtroom, confidentiality of court and agency records in juvenile proceedings, and a discussion of who the juveniles are that appear in juvenile court

Abuse, Neglect, Dependency, and **Termination of Parental Rights**

This course focuses on Subchapter I of the Juvenile Code. It includes the purpose and substantive, and procedural components of an abuse, neglect, or dependency (A/N/D) action.

TOPICS The requirements for the various stages of an A/N/D case, starting with a mandated report resulting in the filing of a petition and ending with the termination of the court's jurisdiction; and the role of a termination of parental rights proceeding in an A/N/D action

Child Development

District court judges who hear juvenile or child custody cases will learn about child development in a smallgroup, interactive setting.

TOPICS Normative child development: infancy to adolescence; developmental variations, including autism spectrum disorders, early onset behavior disorders, and common adolescent mental health conditions; the impacts of abuse, neglect, and trauma on child development, practical strategies to build a traumainformed courtroom; and making developmentally appropriate judicial decisions

Juvenile Delinquency

This course covers procedures that govern juvenile delinquency proceedings from pre-petition through post-adjudication.

TOPICS Intake and diversion, preliminary procedures, transfer and removal, adjudication, disposition, motions for review and violation hearings, how delinquency court might function in a trauma-informed manner, the role of the juvenile court counselor, and the collateral consequences of delinquency adjudication

Understanding Substance Use Disorder

The course is designed for judges who hear juvenile or custody cases.

TOPICS Introduction to issues related to substance use, including the nature of substance use and the science behind it, treatment and services, confidentiality laws, and the laws in G.S. Chapters 7B and 50 that specifically address substance use

Advanced Child Welfare Certification Classes

A Closer Look at Termination of **Parental Rights**

The course focuses on termination of parental rights proceedings, both when there is and is not an underlying abuse, neglect, or dependency proceeding. It highlights common procedural and substantive issues often present in these cases and requirements for court orders entered in these proceedings.

CERTIFICATION Required for Advanced Child Welfare Certification

Dispositions in A/N/D Court: Structuring Court-Ordered Plans

This course focuses on the components of dispositional orders impacting respondent parents that are entered in an abuse, neglect, or dependency action. Judges will understand the respondents' experiences in meeting expectations and learn how to enter orders that are designed to allow a parent to succeed so that reunification is more likely to be achieved. This multiday course requires judges to complete exercises in their home jurisdiction as well as participate in online programming and will take place over the course of one week. Attendees will complete a simulated experience in working a dispositional case plan.

Dual Juvenile System Involvement

This course will focus on the unique issues that arise when juveniles are involved in both the child welfare and juvenile justice systems.

TOPICS Prevalence of dual system involvement, legal issues that arise when a juvenile in foster care becomes involved in the juvenile justice system, legal issues that occur when a juvenile is in foster care because of a delinquency case, and best practices for managing dual system matters

AUDIENCE District Court Judges

SCHEDULE Every 4 years for 2 days

LEAD FACULTY Sara DePasquale, Jacquelyn Greene **CERTIFICATION** Elective for Advanced Child Welfare Certification and Advanced Juvenile Justice Certification

Educational Issues for Systems-Involved Youth

This course explores the connection between juvenile court proceedings and the education system, with an emphasis on the educational rights of children.

TOPICS School enrollment and educational stability for children in foster care: special education: school discipline; the role of law enforcement in schools; the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA); and information sharing between juvenile court, social service agencies, the Department of Juvenile Justice, and schools

Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA)

This course focuses on the Indian Child Welfare Act, a federal law that applies to abuse, neglect, dependency, termination of parental rights, and adoption actions. Attendees will travel to Cherokee. North Carolina, to learn about ICWA and the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians, the requirements of ICWA, and how the tribe addresses child welfare cases for their children. Participants will visit landmark sites including the tribal courthouse, the New Kituwah Academy, and the Museum of the Cherokee People.

Interstate Compact on the Placement of Children (ICPC)

This online course addresses the law and regulations that apply to interstate issues related to the placement of juveniles in out-of-state foster and/or pre-adoptive homes when an out-of-home placement arises in an abuse, neglect, or dependency case.

TOPICS When the ICPC applies, how the ICPC process works, challenges with the ICPC, and North Carolina appellate opinions addressing the ICPC

AUDIENCE District Court Judges **SCHEDULE** Every 4 years for 1 day

LEAD FACULTY Sara DePasquale **CERTIFICATION** Elective for Advanced Child Welfare Certification

Mental Health Issues in Juvenile Court

This course focuses on children with mental health needs who are the subject of district court proceedings, including delinguency, abuse, neglect, dependency, and judicial review of a minor's voluntary admission to a restricted psychiatric facility.

TOPICS Laws governing the proceedings that enable a court to enter orders addressing a child's mental health needs; the procedure for determining a juvenile's capacity to proceed in a delinquency action; common mental health issues experience by children who are the subject of these court proceedings; and the North Carolina behavioral health delivery system and services that are available within that system

AUDIENCE District Court Judges **SCHEDULE** Every 3 years for 3 days

Advanced Juvenile Justice **Certification Classes**

Dispositions in Juvenile Justice

This course explores using dispositional alternatives in a delinquency case to effectively disrupt patterns of repeat offending among youth. The course will also include a hands-on activity to practice structuring an effective delinquency disposition.

TOPICS The risk, needs, and responsivity principle; best practices in probation supervision; and evidence-based interventions

CERTIFICATION Elective for Advanced Juvenile Justice Certification

Dual Juvenile System Involvement

This course will focus on the unique issues that arise when juveniles are involved in both the child welfare and juvenile justice systems.

TOPICS Prevalence of dual system involvement, legal issues that arise when a juvenile who is in foster care becomes involved in the juvenile justice system, legal issues that occur when a juvenile is in foster care as a result of a delinquency case, and best practices for managing dual system matters

AUDIENCE District Court Judges

SCHEDULE Every 4 years for 2 days

Educational Issues for Systems-Involved Youth

This course explores the connection between juvenile court proceedings and the education system, with an emphasis on the educational rights of children.

TOPICS School enrollment and educational stability for children in foster care: special education: school discipline; the role of law enforcement in schools; the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA); and information sharing between juvenile court, social service agencies, the Department of Juvenile Justice, and schools

Interstate Compact for Juveniles

This course addresses the law and rules that govern interstate issues related to juvenile justice cases.

TOPICS Returning out-of-state runaways to their home state, returning out-of-state juveniles accused of acts of delinquency to the state where they are charged, and transferring supervision of a juvenile on probation to another state for supervision

AUDIENCE District Court Judges

Juvenile Capacity to Proceed

This course covers the legal standards and procedures for determining juvenile capacity to proceed.

TOPICS Legal and clinical details of the law, including what the juvenile capacity standard means, how to understand juvenile capacity evaluations, when a juvenile is eligible for remediation services, what remediation services entail, and how a case may proceed following remediation

AUDIENCE District Court Judges

SCHEDULE Every 4 years for 1 day

CERTIFICATION Elective for Advanced Juvenile Justice Certification

Juvenile Transfer to Superior Court

This course focuses on the procedure that governs the transfer of delinquency cases to superior court for criminal processing. Participants can apply the material covered and discuss their questions with a panel of experienced judges.

TOPICS Filing the petition through the appeal of a transfer order; various pathways for transfer and the situations in which they can be used: the law that governs the removal of cases from superior court to juvenile court for processing as delinquency matter

CERTIFICATION Required for Advanced Juvenile Justice Certification

Mental Health Issues in Juvenile Court

This course focuses on children with mental health needs who are the subject of district court proceedings, including delinquency, abuse, neglect, dependency, and judicial review of a minor's voluntary admission to a restricted psychiatric facility.

TOPICS Laws governing the proceedings that enable a court to enter orders addressing a child's mental health needs; the procedure for determining a juvenile's capacity to proceed in a delinquency action; common mental health issues experience by children who are the subject of these court proceedings; and the North Carolina behavioral health delivery system and services that are available within that system

AUDIENCE District Court Judges **SCHEDULE** Every 3 years for 3 days

What Life is Like in Delinquency Out-of-**Home Settings**

This course allows a small group of judges to visit out-of-home settings used in delinquency matters. Visits include a youth development center, a juvenile detention center, and a community-based setting. Participants tour facilities and engage with staff.

SCHEDULE Every other year for 1 day in each of three regions of the state

Leadership Classes

Chief District Court Judge Leadership Training

This course allows chief district court judges to develop the leadership skills they need in their administrative and supervisory roles. Each year, the course focuses on a particular aspect of leadership, such as communication, team building, strategic planning, case management, and conflict management.

Magistrates

Core Classes

Basic School for Magistrates

This course covers the elements of crimes, criminal procedure, small claims procedure, summary ejectment, contracts, ethics, and handling funds. By invitation only

AUDIENCE Newly Appointed Magistrates **SCHEDULE** Twice per year (once in winter and once in summer) for 2 weeks each (civil week and criminal week) LEAD FACULTY Melanie Crenshaw, Belal Elrahal **SPONSOR** Administrative Office of the Courts

Introduction to Small Claims

This course is for magistrates who are, or soon will be, holding small claims court, whether as a backup civil magistrate or on a more regular basis. It provides a refresher on the legal principles often addressed in small claims cases and the rules of procedure. It is a skill-based course that offers students instruction and practice in correctly deciding small claims cases and acting as a judicial official in conducting small claims court.

AUDIENCE Magistrates **SCHEDULE** Annually for 4 days **LEAD FACULTY** Melanie Crenshaw **CERTIFICATION** Required for Magistrate Civil Law Certification

SPONSOR Administrative Office of the Courts

Regional Magistrate Trainings

These regional trainings are for magistrates who are unable to attend in-person training. District court judges may also benefit from attending. These trainings will include a combination of lectures, group discussions, and interactive exercises.

TOPICS Setting conditions of pretrial release, domestic violence, driving while impaired, summary ejectment, and small claims procedure

AUDIENCE Magistrates

SCHEDULE Annually, for 1 day per region

One-Day Civil Law Seminar for Magistrates

This program is for magistrates holding small claims court, those anticipating holding small claims court, and those interested in civil law topics. Some training sessions may be repeated from the fall magistrates' conference.

TOPICS Case law and legislative updates, involuntary commitment, domestic violence protective orders, small claims procedure, and summary ejectment

AUDIENCE Magistrates

CERTIFICATION Optional component for Magistrate Civil Law Certification

Conducting Hearings and Entering Judgments for Magistrates

This course is for magistrates who want to become more comfortable conducting hearings and entering judgments in small claims court. It culminates in a mock trial exercise, during which magistrates apply the skills they have learned. *Introduction to Small Claims* is a prerequisite for this course.

TOPICS Courtroom decorum, legal research, judicial decision-making, procedural fairness, common evidence problems, and completing judgment forms

AUDIENCE Magistrates

Domestic Violence for Magistrates

This course covers issues related to domestic violence including applicable sessions, criminal law and procedure.

Involuntary Commitment for Magistrates

This course is for magistrates who conduct hearings related to involuntary commitments.

TOPICS Identifying information relevant to the commitment decision, basic skills for interviewing and eliciting information, trauma-informed interviewing, learning about mental illnesses, how to work with hospital emergency departments, making legal determinations related to mental illness and dangerousness, and properly implementing the decision to initiate the involuntary commitment process AUDIENCE Magistrates

CERTIFICATION Optional component for Magistrate Certification in Civil Law

Special Topics in Small Claims

This course focuses on a different topic every other year, allowing a "deep dive" into skill-building and substantive law for small claims magistrates at various stages in their careers. Participants receive hands-on instruction and practice.

TOPICS Anticipating, preventing, and resolving common procedural issues in small claims court; evaluating evidence in terms of relevance, significance, validity, and reliability at trial; developing personalized checklists, scripts, and standardized practices to improve consistency and confidence in conducting court; understanding, identifying and skillfully responding to the needs and expectations of litigants and attorneys; and entering judgment

Judicial Decision-Making for Magistrates

This course offers an intensive exploration of magistrates' judicial decision-making. The focus is improving participants' abilities to correctly make legal decisions and identify and guard against improper influences. This seminar is highly interactive.

TOPICS Hearsay, confrontation, experts, child witnesses, impeachment, character and habit, Rule 404(b), evidentiary issues in self-defense cases, and authentication of digital and video evidence

Advanced Criminal Procedure for Superior Court Judges

This course covers many of the challenging procedural issues in criminal trials.

This program explores law and practice related to the control of the courtroom and cases.

Capital Case Law and Death Penalty Litigation

Capital cases are among the most difficult for judges to handle. The stakes are high, and the legal issues presented in death penalty trials are often complex. The public, the media, and the appellate courts closely scrutinize these cases. This course helps judges handle these cases efficiently and correctly.

TOPICS Case management, jury selection, experts and discovery, and capital sentencing hearings

Medical Malpractice for Superior Court Judges

This course covers the issues that set medical negligence cases apart from other civil matters. It addresses both legal theories and practical considerations important to managing these cases.

TOPICS Requests for extension of time to file a complaint—Rule 9(j), theories of the case, Rule 9(j) pleading issues, discovery scheduling orders and case management issues, Rule 702 restrictions on expert testimony, Chapter 90 restrictions on expert testimony, proximate cause and causation issues, discovery issues, jury instructions, and damages

Post-Conviction Proceedings for Superior Court Judges

This course teaches judges how to rule effectively and appropriately on issues that arise after a criminal conviction.

TOPICS Procedural issues related to motions for appropriate relief, substantive claims such as ineffective assistance of counsel and sentencing errors, post-conviction sex offender registration proceedings, habeas corpus, and expunctions and certificates of relief

This course helps judges manage that workload by crafting lawful and effective probationary sentences to achieve their intended result. Judges can avoid common sentencing errors and better understand how Community Corrections (Probation) administers their judgments.

What punishments work to reduce crime and improve outcomes for criminal defendants? What factors drive our prison population? North Carolina's court system has experienced its fair share of challenges and change over the past few years. Pandemic-related protocols and delays, retirements, the implementation of eCourts, and other events have pressured the system and the people who lead and manage it. This court leadership seminar helps develop and strengthen leadership teams. It helps teams develop strategies to address identified priorities and concerns, including issues related to case management, the implementation of eCourts, and other developments.

Experiential Learning Seminars

Correctional Facilities Tours

This program gives court officials a better understanding of how the Division of Adult Correction administers judgments. Participants tour correctional facilities to gain a firsthand view of the typical places that house criminal defendants. The course includes time for relevant legal instruction and a question-and-answer period.

Participants will attend oral arguments at the North Carolina Supreme Court and participate in other related activities as schedules permit, including visiting the General Assembly and the Supreme Court Historical Society.



The group will also participate in a lecture on law and justice at the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum, tour the Charters of Freedom at the National Archives, and visit other institutions.

Certifications

Juvenile Court Certification

Juvenile certification training requires that a district court judge:

> Complete a core curriculum approved by the AOC which includes the following required

- · Introduction to Juvenile Court **Proceedings**
- · Abuse, Neglect, Dependency and Termination of Parental Rights
- Child Development for District Court Judges
- Juvenile Delinquency
- Understanding Substance Use Disorders

At any time after completing the first of the five courses, but no later than 12 months after completing the final course, the judge must preside over

- At least 100 juvenile hearings (adjudication or disposition hearings, including termination of parental rights or other contested matters) or
- · Fifty percent of the juvenile hearings in a
- At completion, the chief district court judge must certify to the AOC that the judge has met these requirements.

To maintain Juvenile Court Certification, a judge must complete six hours of continuing judicial education in each biennium at designated juvenile courses offered by the North Carolina Judicial College or at designated juvenile sessions at the district court judges' conferences.

Advanced Child Welfare Certification

Advanced certification in child welfare requires that a district court judge:

> Acquire and maintain Juvenile Court Certification.

Complete a core advanced certification curriculum approved by the AOC and offered through the North Carolina Judicial College, which includes the following required courses:

- Educational Issues for Systems-Involved
- Mental Health Issues in Juvenile Court
- Dispositions in A/N/D Court: Structuring Court-Ordered Plans
- A Closer Look at Termination of Parental Rights

Complete two child welfare elective courses offered through the North Carolina Judicial College, which include the following:

- Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA)
- Interstate Compact on the Placement of Children (ICPC)
- Dual Juvenile System Involvement
- Other electives as designed and administered by the North Carolina Judicial College

Continue to preside over abuse, neglect, dependency, and/or termination of parental rights matters. The chief district court judge must certify to the AOC that the judge meets this requirement.

To maintain Advanced Child Welfare Certification, a judge must complete six hours of continuing judicial education in each biennium at designated juvenile courses offered by the North Carolina Judicial College or at designated juvenile sessions at the district court judges' conferences.

Advanced Juvenile Justice Certification

Advanced certification in juvenile justice requires that a district court judge:

Judicial College

To maintain Advanced Certification in Juvenile Justice, a judge must complete six hours of continuing judicial education in each biennium at designated juvenile courses offered by the North Carolina Judicial College or at designated juvenile sessions at the district court judges' conferences.

Magistrate Certification

The Judicial College offers magistrates the opportunity to become certified upon completing a specific combination of courses, seminars, and sessions offered by the Judicial College. Two types of certifications are available, one in criminal law and the other in civil law. Magistrates may be certified in either civil or criminal law or both. Participation in the certification program is entirely optional. The program aims to acknowledge and document the commitment and accomplishments

of magistrates who pursue a focused course of study in these areas. There is no time limit within which participants must complete these requirements.

Not all courses are available annually. Judicial College courses previously attended are eligible for credit if they fall into the categories set below. However, no credit is available for viewing recordings of online trainings after the date they were offered live.

Note: Sessions on topics taken during Basic School for Magistrates do not count towards the certification requirements.

Each November, the Judicial College notifies magistrates that they may file a request for certification.

Continuing Education

Continuing Judicial Education (CJE)

The Rules of Continuing Judicial Education apply to North Carolina District Court, Superior Court, and Court of Appeals judges, and to the chief justice and associate justices of the North Carolina Supreme Court. The rules also apply to retired judges and justices qualified as emergency or recalled judges or justices.

Every judge in the trial division must attend an orientation for new judges provided by the School of Government and Administrative Office of the Courts within the first year after appointment or election. This attendance counts toward the hours of instruction required for the biennium in which the course occurs.

- In each biennium, judges and justices of the trial and appellate division must attend at least 30 hours of instruction in one or more approved continuing legal or judicial education programs, effective with the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027.
- At least 15 of the 30 hours required must be designed especially for judges and attended exclusively or primarily by judges. All superior court judges are expected to attend the scheduled superior court judges' conferences. All district court judges are expected to attend the scheduled district court judges' conferences. For district court judges designated as family court judges, at least 24 of the 30 required hours must be continuing judicial education courses designed especially for family court.
- Judges participating as teachers, lecturers, discussion leaders, or panelists in an approved program receive five hours of credit for each hour of actual presentation time. Presentation of the same material on subsequent occasions accrues credit for the actual presentation time only.

The AOC maintains all continuing judicial education records for judges.

Magistrate Continuing Education Training (G.S. 7A-177)

Within six months of taking the oath of office, a magistrate must complete an introductory training course of at least 40 hours in the civil and criminal duties of a magistrate. The School of Government offers *Basic School for Magistrates* twice yearly to allow new magistrates to satisfy this requirement. Annually, magistrates must satisfactorily complete at least 12 hours of training in civil and criminal duties of a magistrate, which must include, but is not limited to, the following subjects:
