Local Government Training Program

The Local Government Training Program (LGTP) at Western Carolina University offers courses and resources from the UNC School of Government to address the training needs of public officials and personnel in the 26 westernmost counties of North Carolina. Each year, the LGTP surveys public officials in the region to identify their training and technical assistance needs, working closely with the School to ensure these needs are met through training, conferences, seminars, and workshops that provide law, finance, and public administration instruction. The LGTP also administers the Western North Carolina City and County Managers Association, an organization of public administrators that meets quarterly to share information, learn about trends in public administration, and discuss regional issues.

GENERAL LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Throughout our 95-year history, School of Government faculty have dedicated their time to understanding the ins and outs of local governments in North Carolina. From broad-ranging courses right for any public servant to specific technical programs, our general local government courses ensure practitioners have the tools necessary to succeed.

Local Government Law Fundamentals

Oct. 1, 2025 Chapel Hill Feb. 17, 2026 Chapel Hill

This course is designed for individuals who are new to the local government profession or are starting a role within it. It covers essential aspects of local government law in North Carolina, including the authority, purpose, and structure of cities and counties, as well as topics such as finance, open meetings, public records, ethics, and conflicts of interest.

Municipal and County Administration

Session 1 begins Oct. 7, 2025 Chapel Hill

Attendance is offered by application only. Scholarships available; see p. 3.

Our flagship course has been available to North Carolina's public servants since 1954 and has more than 4,500 alumni. This course will give participants a chance to fully understand the roles, rules, and operations of city and county governments in our state, while becoming part of a broad network of local government peers to rely on for assistance in the future.

This course runs from October to May.

Basic School for Registers of Deeds

Nov. 18-19, 2025 Chapel Hill

This course covers the basic operations of the office of register of deeds. It offers the opportunity to take an exam for initial NCARD certification.

Effective Internal Controls for Local Governments

Nov. 19, 2025 Online May 19, 2026 Chapel Hill

Local governments must have a proper internal control framework that promotes efficient business operations and guards against fraud, misuse, waste, and abuse risks. This course explores ways local governments can apply the five components of internal control—outlined in the U.S. Government Accountability Office "Green Book"—to implement a strong internal control system. Participants will learn to design control activities that help ensure compliance with the statutory internal control requirements included in the Local Government Budget and Fiscal Control Act and learn to establish internal controls over expenditures of federal grant funds.

Introduction to Program Evaluation

Dec. 2, 2025 Online **Jun. 10, 2026** Online

This workshop offers a broad overview of program evaluation for local and state government and community-based organizations. It covers the six key stages: how evaluation works for organizations, logic models, process evaluations, analyzing long-term impact, analyzing data, and communicating results.

Experienced School for Registers of Deeds

Jan. 27-29, 2026 Chapel Hill

This course reviews the basic operations of the office of register of deeds and is intended for those with several years of experience in a register of deeds office. It provides instruction on county government and its revenues and expenditures, sources of law and rules governing registers of deeds, the organization and responsibilities of the office, introduction to real estate instruments, recording and indexing real property instruments, vital records, public records management, and marriage licenses.

CERTIFICATION

Registers of Deeds Certification

The certification program is open to voting members of a North Carolina Register of Deeds office and their deputies and assistants. To apply for certification, an individual must either be elected or appointed to the Register of Deeds office or appointed as a deputy or assistant register of deeds.

To obtain initial certification, a register, deputy, or assistant must first complete the following requirements:

- 1. Serve for two years in a register's office.
- 2. Complete the *Basic School for Registers of Deeds* course at the School of Government.
- 3. Complete at least 25 hours of qualifying instruction, including a minimum of 10 hours in specified subjects, within five years of the application date for certification.

SPECIAL COURSE SERIES

Evidence-Based Decision-Making Course Series

A combination of new and existing courses makes up this series for those interested in evidence-based methodologies to improve service delivery and outcomes.

Strategic Planning in Local Government

Sep. 12, 2025 Chapel Hill

This one-day workshop helps public managers develop new strategic plans or improve their existing plans. It introduces and demystifies the strategic planning process through accessible models, step-by-step guidance, and flexible tools.

Performance Measurement for Local Government

Oct. 23, 2025 Chapel Hill

This one-day workshop helps public officials design measures in local government for accountability and results. It introduces the types of performance measures commonly found in local government, how to develop good measures from goals and objectives, and how they can be used to support other management processes.

Performance Management in Local Government

Oct. 24, 2025 Chapel Hill

This one-day workshop focuses on converting performance information into decisions that enhance organizational outcomes. The workshop introduces and applies analysis techniques, decision venues, and best practices.

Practical Analytic Techniques

Oct. 28, 2025 Chapel Hill

Participants in this course will learn techniques for planning, monitoring, and evaluating programs and activities. The course focuses on a variety of easy-to-apply analytic techniques and includes examples of successful analysis among local governments.

Process Improvement Techniques

Oct. 29, 2025 Chapel Hill

This course focuses on tools to analyze and improve process performance to drive better results within your organization.

Elevate Organizational Performance

Nov. 14, 2025 Chapel Hill

Local governments that focus on the fundamentals of leadership, strategic planning, performance improvement, and genuine engagement can create a high-performance framework to deliver positive, consistent results, elevate organizational performance, and, ultimately, enhance the quality of life for their communities.

Introduction to Program Evaluation

Dec. 2, 2025 Online **Jun. 10, 2026** Online

This workshop offers a broad overview of program evaluation for local and state government and community-based organizations. It covers the six key stages: how evaluation works for organizations, logic models, process evaluations, analyzing long-term impact, analyzing data, and communicating results.

Performance Management In Service Departments Course Series

This series focuses on converting performance information into decisions that enhance the outcomes of various departments in local government. Participants will learn accessible step-by-step techniques to demystify the performance management process for public managers and provide data management and decision-making templates to help implement performance management in their respective departments.

STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT ATTORNEYS

Stay up to date on the laws and regulations that affect your jurisdiction and sharpen your skillsets as you serve your community. Offerings for attorneys provide the opportunity to network with peers and colleagues from around the state to share best practices and knowledge.

Child Welfare 101

Oct. 27-29, 2025 Chapel Hill

This three-day course is designed for attorneys representing a county child welfare department with three or fewer years of experience in this subject area of the law. It will address the laws and procedures applicable to abuse, neglect, dependency, and termination of parental rights proceedings.

Public Law for the Public's Lawyers

Oct. 29-31, 2025 Online

Participants can gain 12 annual CLE credits (including technology, professionalism, and professional well-being) addressing issues relevant to attorneys who work in state government. The online classes will be spread out over three days. As permitted by State Bar rules, a video replay will be available afterward.

County Attorneys' Fundamentals

Jan. 29, 2026 Chapel Hill | Hybrid

The workshop format allows new(er) and more seasoned county attorneys to explore common issues in county law in more depth. Each year is focused on a different topic area. Recent topics include economic development, 160D, public records and open meetings, and representing your board.

County Attorneys' Winter Conference

Jan. 29-30, 2026 Chapel Hill | Hybrid

This conference covers topics of interest to county attorneys. Specific sessions will be scheduled prior to the event but typically include one hour of ethics and one hour of technology. It can be paired with *County Attorneys' Fundamentals*.

School Attorneys' Conference

Feb. 6, 2026 Chapel Hill | Hybrid

This conference offers school board attorneys the opportunity to learn about and discuss current issues related to public education law. Superintendents are also invited to attend.

Social Services Attorneys' Winter Conference

Feb. 19-20, 2026 Chapel Hill | Hybrid

Attendees are limited to attorneys and paralegals representing county departments of social services. The course is offered in a hybrid format, allowing in-person and online participation.

Municipal Attorneys' Fundamentals

Mar. 25-26, 2026 Chapel Hill | Hybrid

This course is for attorneys new to municipal law and open to those interested in a basic introduction to municipal law. Offered in conjunction with the *Municipal Attorneys' Winter Conference*, it runs for two half days immediately preceding the main conference and includes one hour of ethics.

Municipal Attorneys' Winter Conference

Mar. 26-27, 2026 Chapel Hill | Hybrid

This conference focuses on topics of interest to municipal attorneys and includes one hour of ethics and one hour of technology.

COMMUNITY AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

As our state continues to grow, it relies on professionals invested in community and economic development to guide it forward. Our courses help you focus on the activities, strategies, and goals that will help your community thrive.

Basic Economic Development

Jul. 28-31, 2025 Chapel Hill

This four-day introductory course is a comprehensive educational experience that integrates theoretical and practical perspectives and provides participants with the foundation needed to organize, plan, and implement economic development programs.

Affordable Housing Seminar: Tools, Strategies, and Case Studies for Local Government Leadership

Oct. 16, 2025 Chapel Hill

May 2026 Date and Location TBD

This interactive seminar is designed for local government elected officials, managers, and department heads who are setting strategic direction around affordable housing. The seminar will focus on local government support and public-private partnerships for workforce residential housing.

Development Finance Toolbox

Dec. 2-4, 2025 Online

Participants in this course will learn how local governments use public-private partnerships and finance tools to attract private development to achieve their community and economic development goals. Covered tools include tax credit financing, mezzanine loans, TIF, and business improvement districts, among others.

Community Development Academy

Mar. 17-19 and Apr. 14-16, 2026 Chapel Hill

This intensive course is designed for community development practitioners. It covers the concepts, methods, and strategies of community economic development. It includes federal and state funding, revitalization methods, affordable housing, and grants management. Course delivery alternates each year between online and in person.

Essentials of Economic Development

Spring 2026 Date and Location TBD

This one-day workshop covers promising strategies and tools for promoting economic development in the face of changing fiscal and economic conditions. With a special emphasis on the role of local elected officials, the content includes an overview of economic development, the characteristics of an effective program, and the legal framework governing public-private partnerships for development.

Economic Development Tools and Strategies

On demand

This one-hour web module, designed for management and elected officials, describes the public-private partnership tools that local governments use to engage in economic development and some of the legal requirements associated with those tools. It describes options for organizing and structuring the delivery of economic development programs and services.

CITY AND COUNTY CLERKS

We're here to support you as you support your board and organization. Our partnerships with national organizations help us offer all the courses you need to maintain certifications and reach master level.

Clerks' Certification Institute

Aug. 4–8, Oct. 13–17, 2025, and 2026 Dates TBD Chapel Hill

The Clerks' Certification Institute runs for 20 days each year and provides instruction in subjects involving the core responsibilities of municipal and county clerks.

New Clerks' Institute

Nov. 12, 2025 Durham

New Clerks' Institute provides a one-day crash course on subjects vital to the work of clerks to municipal and county governing boards. Topics covered include the open meetings law, the public records law, meeting agendas and minutes, public notices, oaths of office, and board procedure fundamentals.

Master Clerks' Academy I

Nov. 12, 2025 Durham

This program provides advanced continuing education designed to meet the needs of clerks, deputy clerks, and assistant clerks to city councils, boards of county commissioners, and other local government boards.

Master Clerks' Academy II

Nov. 13-14, 2025 Durham

Master Clerks' Academy II is also offered at the North Carolina Association of County Clerks Annual Conference and the North Carolina Association of Municipal Clerks Summer Conference.

Continuing the knowledge gained in Master Clerks Academy I, this program provides more in-depth knowledge and information about the challenges faced by clerks, deputy clerks, and assistant clerks in their service to local government boards.



Certified Municipal Clerk

Successful completion of the *Clerks' Certification Institute* satisfies the educational requirements specified by the International Institute of Municipal Clerks (IIMC) for designation as a Certified Municipal Clerk (CMC).

It also satisfies a major part of the requirements for designation by the North Carolina Association of Municipal Clerks as a **North Carolina Certified Municipal Clerk** (**NCCMC**) and for designation by the North Carolina Association of County Clerks as a **North Carolina Certified County Clerk** (**NCCCC**).

HUMAN SERVICES

With resources for social service and public health professionals, we are here to keep you up to date on the laws and practices that are relevant to your work.

Child Welfare 101

Oct. 27-29. 2025 Chapel Hill

This three-day course is designed for attorneys representing a county child welfare department with three or fewer years of experience in this subject area of the law. It will address the laws and procedures applicable to abuse, neglect, dependency, and termination of parental rights proceedings.

Legal Basics for Health and Human Services Directors and Administrators

Nov. 3-5, 2025 Chapel Hill

This course is designed to provide leaders in local public health, social services, and consolidated human services agencies with an introduction to key areas of North Carolina law affecting their agencies' services at the local level.

North Carolina Health Directors' Legal Conference

Apr. 22-23, 2026 Chapel Hill

This conference focuses on current legal issues in public health, including significant changes and developments in state and federal law. It is intended for public health professionals working at the state and local levels in North Carolina, including health directors and the attorneys who work with them.

Legal Basics for Consolidated Human Services Boards

On demand

This on-demand web module is a one-hour orientation for those serving on governing boards for consolidated human services agencies. Counties that purchase the on-demand module may access it at any time for use with current or new consolidated human services board members or county commissioners who serve as the governing board for a consolidated human services agency.

PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT REGULATION

Planning and Development Regulation

Attendance is offered by application only. Applications for the 2025 sessions are now closed. We will begin accepting applications for the 2026 dates on Dec. 1, 2025.

This course is held in three sessions and incorporates the subject matter of the previous planning and development regulations curriculum, including zoning practice, subdivision practice, and zoning official certification. Single registration covers all three sessions. Completion of the *Planning and Development Regulation* series satisfies the coursework portion of the qualification for becoming a Certified Zoning Official.

SESSION 1: Development Ordinances

Sept. 8–11, 2025 Online **Mar. 23–27, 2026** Online

Addressing the legal framework for planning and development regulations in North Carolina, this course covers statutory authority, constitutional limits, and rules for decision-making such as quasi-judicial procedures. Additionally, this course covers jurisdictional topics such as annexation and extraterritorial jurisdiction as well as comprehensive planning.

SESSION 2: Permits, Plats, and Site Plans

Oct. 6–9, 2025 Online Apr. 20–24, 2026 Online

Addressing the policies and practices of land development permitting, this course covers permitting authority, site plan and subdivision review, and development standards. Additionally, this course covers development exactions and growth management.

SESSION 3: Land Use Administration

Nov. 12–14, 2025 Chapel Hill May 20–22, 2026 Chapel Hill

Addressing the legal and practical considerations of administering development regulations, this course covers inspections and enforcement, interpreting the ordinance, and other duties of the zoning officer. Additionally, this course covers liability, conflicts, and open governance obligations.

Solutions Forum: Grappling with Growth

Sept. 18–19, 2025 Chapel Hill **June 10–11, 2026** Chapel Hill

This workshop will address specific topics and needs of those in planning and development regulation. Topics and content are still TBD, but course updates will be posted online as they are made available.

Planning and Zoning 101

Feb. 24-25, 2026 Chapel Hill

This two-day course provides the basics in planning and development regulations. With an overview of land use planning, zoning, subdivision, and related topics, this course is appropriate for local government staff members who are new to planning and zoning work, board members looking for additional training, and related professionals interested in a primer on planning and development regulations.

Regional Planning Board Workshops for Legislative Decision-Making Boards

Apr. and May 2026 Dates TBD Regional Locations and Online

Half-day workshops designed for member citizen boards, such as governing and planning boards, that handle legislative development regulatory decisions. These workshops are appropriate for elected officials interested in planning and zoning decisions.

Certified Zoning Official (CZO)

In partnership with the North Carolina Association of Zoning Officials (NCAZO), the *Planning and Development Regulation* course is a requirement to become a Certified Zoning Official. To qualify for certification, officials must:

- · Complete Planning and Development Regulation
- · Pass the Zoning Officials Certification Exam
- · Be a member of NCAZO
- · Meet minimum experience standard set forth by NCAZO

STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT FINANCE

Covering a range of topics from general finance to budgeting, accounting, auditing, and tax law, our finance courses and resources can further the career of all state and local government finance professionals in North Carolina.

Cash Management and Investment of Public Funds

Jul. 15-17, 2025 Chapel Hill

This course will meet intermittently in this time period for half days of online learning. A more detailed schedule will be released as registration opens. This intermediate course will teach participants about goals, processes, and organizations for successful cash management; how to evaluate banking services and financial institutions; investment strategies; investment policies; and accounting and reporting for investments.

Introduction to Local Government Finance

Aug. 25-29, 2025 Chapel Hill | Hybrid

This introductory course provides basic instruction in local government and public authority finance and financial management. Areas of instruction include the basic legal authority and requirements governing local government revenues, budgeting processes, cash management, purchasing and contracting, expenditure control, conflicts of interest, fund accounting, and financial reporting. The course also provides an overview of the state and local economic issues that inform strategic budgeting decisions.

Capital Financing in Local Government

Sep. 15-17, 2025 Chapel Hill | Hybrid

This course will take a deep dive into capital budgeting and state law authority to borrow money and use other funding tools for capital outlay.

Budgeting in Local Government

Nov. 17-20, 2025 Chapel Hill

This four-day course covers the legal and management framework of budget preparation and enactment in North Carolina local government. Program topics include tax efficiency and equity, revenue forecasting, resource allocation, fund balance, financial condition analysis, budget presentation, and more.

Stormwater and Green Infrastructure Finance

Dec. 3, 2025 Chapel Hill

This course covers a range of topics related to financing and managing stormwater programs and green infrastructure services. It is hosted by the UNC School of Government Environmental Finance Center.

Water and Wastewater Finance Strategies Workshop

Feb. 3-4, 2026 Chapel Hill

This two-day workshop provides utility practitioners with skills and up-to-date information on pricing utility services, infrastructure finance and planning strategies, and accessing funding resources. It is hosted by the UNC School of Government Environmental Finance Center.

Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting

Mar. 10-13, 2026 Chapel Hill

This course covers the fundamentals of governmental accounting and financial reporting: concepts, standards, and procedures with a special emphasis on North Carolina laws and regulation.

North Carolina Certified State Government Budget Professional Program

Attendence is offered by application only. The application deadline is in Fall 2025.

The North Carolina Office of State Budget and Management, through consultation with an advisory board of state chief financial officers, budget directors, and others, has identified training and career advancement opportunities for state budget professionals as key to enhancing the work product of budget professionals statewide and increasing retention rates among state budget professionals.

Q CERTIFICATIONS

North Carolina Local Government Finance Officers Certification Program

Finance officers of local governments, public authorities, local school administrative units, or those who hold supervisory or professional positions with a local government, public authority, or school administrative unit and have administrative responsibility for one or more financial functions, are eligible for the North Carolina Local Government Finance Officers Certification Program. Alongside membership in NCGFOA, requisite years of professional experience, and successful completion of the four topical exams (accounting, budgeting, cash management, and supervisory management), the following courses must be completed for certification:

North Carolina Certified State Government Budget Professional Program

This program—a collaboration between OSBM and the UNC School of Government—provides comprehensive training on state budgeting and financial matters. Participants who successfully complete the program and pass the exam earn certification as a State Government Budget Professional from OSBM. Program information is available on p. 12.

Certified Local Government Budget Officer (CLGBO)

This voluntary program, sponsored by the North Carolina Local Government Budget Association (NCLGBA), is designed to enhance the local government budget and evaluation profession in North Carolina. It recognizes individual achievement for an established level of knowledge on topics of budgeting, performance, and evaluation. Professionals with sufficient experience and education can complete the necessary coursework and exams to become certified budget and evaluation officers. Reappraisal in North Carolina

Sep. 8-11, 2025 Chapel Hill | Hybrid

This workshop focuses on law and practice governing the general reappraisal of real property in North Carolina. It is designed to help assessors and the appraisal staff use statistical measures to better ensure accuracy and uniformity of property tax assessments, learn the basics of general reappraisal, and how to objectively plan for the next reappraisal.

Fundamentals of Property Tax Collection Law

PURCHASING

Contracting for Construction and Design Services

Sep. 23-25, 2025 Chapel Hill | Hybrid

This course addresses topics of interest to those involved in construction contracting and procuring the services of engineers and architects. Instructors and panelists will explain the additional requirements for construction procurement and contracting and will explore the challenges and best practices for accomplishing a construction project.

Intermediate Purchasing Seminar

Nov. 18-20, 2025 Chapel Hill

This three-day seminar is intended for officials with two or more years of experience in local government purchasing, but prior experience is not required. It will sharpen participants' purchasing skills and deepen their understanding of the legal and practical aspects of public purchasing. If you're new to purchasing, you may wish to start your professional development path with Basic Principles of Local Government Purchasing instead.

Basic Principles of Local Government Purchasing

Jan. 26-28, 2026 Chapel Hill | Hybrid

This course is designed for new local government purchasing officials and covers basic principles and legal requirements for local government procurement, conflicts of interest, and property disposal. This course includes instruction across a broad range of topics and can be a useful refresher on procurement, including Uniform Guidance.

Minority Participation Programs and Public Contracting

Mar. 24-25, 2026 Chapel Hill

This course will examine federal and state laws that encourage participation in public contracts by historically underutilized businesses (HUBs), minority and women-owned business enterprises (MWBEs), and disadvantaged business enterprises (DBEs). Instructors will address the practical aspects of running a HUB/MWBE program, preparing for a disparity study, the development of a HUB/MWBE plan, monitoring contractor compliance with HUB/MWBE requirements, following reporting requirements, and building the capacity of HUB or MWBE firms.

Note: The content of this course is subject to change pending proposed legislation.

Contract Management in Local Government

May 13-15, 2026 Chapel Hill

Developed for mid-career and supervisory professionals in North Carolina local governments, this course will address the multifaceted aspects of contracting with both private contractors and nonprofit organizations. Content will equip public managers to appreciate various make-or-buy decision techniques, learn about management and legal challenges in contracting and how to mitigate them, identify various ways to design context-driven contracts, and learn how to select, administer, and manage contracts.



Certified Local Government Purchasing Officer (CLGPO)

A partnership between the UNC School of Government and the North Carolina Association of Governmental Purchasina

To be eligible for CLGPO certification, an applicant must have at least three years' experience as a governmental purchasing professional; be a member of the North Carolina Association of Governmental Purchasing (NCAGP); complete four core courses offered by the School (below); earn 22 points through activities such as training, conference attendance, and service to NCAGP; and pass a certification examination administered by the School.

Once certified, purchasers are eligible for recertification every five years and may also seek lifetime certification.

Certified Economic Inclusion Officer (CEIO)

Individuals seeking CEIO certification will demonstrate sufficient knowledge, abilities, and experience in legal requirements and practical aspects of administering a HUB, MWBE, or DBE program in the State of North Carolina. To obtain CEIO certification, applicants must complete three core courses (below), have two years' experience in the public supplier diversity profession, earn certification points, and pass an examination administered by the School of Government. Introduction to Public Employment Law

Sep. 16-18 and Oct. 21-23, 2025 Chapel Hill

Whether you are new to human resources, an experienced HR professional new to the public sector and looking to update your skills, or an attorney newly assigned to employment issues for your agency, this is the course for you. This six-day course (spread over two weeks) provides a thorough grounding in the major legal topics relevant to human resources management.

Advanced Family and Medical Leave Act

Nov. 6-7, 2025 Chapel Hill

This intensive, two-day program takes an in-depth look at FMLA issues of particular concern to local government and community college employers. It will focus on the meaning of a "serious health condition," certifications and second opinions, how to manage intermittent leave and reduced leave schedules, fit-for-duty tests, employer 100 percent-healed policies and light duty, employer absence and absence-reporting policies, consequences of failing to provide notice of FMLA leave, and how to investigate and resolve FMLA fraud and abuse.

Participants must complete Introduction to Public Employment Law before registering for this course.

Introduction to Recruitment and Selection Law for Local Government Employers

Jan. 15-16, 2026 Chapel Hill

This intensive, two-day program covers the laws governing recruitment and selection, such as defining and advertising a job, lawful and unlawful questions, background and credit checks, written and physical ability examinations, medical examinations, and how the law distinguishes between employees and independent contractors. This topic is more timely than ever, given the EEOC's new focus on and interpretation of antidiscrimination law under the Trump administration.
