

Advanced Certification in Juvenile Justice for District Court Judges

Juvenile Court Certification Training for district court judges is based on G.S. 7A-147(c), which reads:

(c) The policy of the State is to encourage specialization in juvenile cases by district court judges who are qualified by training and temperament to be effective in relating to youth and in the use of appropriate community resources to meet their needs. The Administrative Office of the Courts is therefore authorized to encourage judges who hear juvenile cases to secure appropriate training whether or not they were elected to a specialized judgeship as provided herein. Such training shall be provided within the funds available to the Administrative Office of the Courts for such training, and judges attending such training shall be reimbursed for travel and subsistence expenses at the same rate as is applicable to other State employees.

The Administrative Office of the Courts shall develop a plan whereby a district court judge may be better qualified to hear juvenile cases by reason of training, experience, and demonstrated ability. Any district court judge who completes the training under this plan shall receive a certificate to this effect from the Administrative Office of the Courts. In districts where there is a district court judge who has completed this training as herein provided, the chief district judge shall give due consideration in the assignment of such cases where practical and feasible.

ADVANCED CERTIFICATION IN JUVENILE JUSTICE REQUIREMENTS

Advanced certification in juvenile justice requires that a district court judge:

1. Maintain juvenile court certification by completing the required continuing judicial education requirements. To maintain juvenile court certification, a judge must complete six hours of continuing judicial education in each biennium at courses administered by the North Carolina Judicial College at the UNC School of Government or at the Summer or Fall Judges' Conference of the North Carolina Association of District Court Judges. Faculty of the North Carolina Judicial College shall designate qualified courses. These six hours may include designated courses that also are counted toward the twenty-four hours required of a Family Court Judge. Hours shall be submitted by the judge to the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC).
2. Complete a core advanced certification curriculum approved by the AOC. The core curriculum consists of the following four courses offered through the North Carolina Judicial College at the UNC School of Government. A judge must attend the entire course to receive credit.
 - a. The following two courses that count for both Advanced Certification in Juvenile Justice and Advanced Certification in Child Welfare
 - i. Educational Issues for Systems-Involved Youth (required)
 - ii. Mental Health Issues in Juvenile Court (required)

- b. The following two courses that count only for Advanced Certification in Juvenile Justice
 - i. Juvenile Transfer to Superior Court (required)
 - ii. What Life is Like in Delinquency Out-of-Home Settings (required)
- 3. Complete two juvenile justice elective courses offered through the North Carolina Judicial College at the UNC School of Government.
 - a. Interstate Compact for Juveniles (elective)
 - b. Juvenile Capacity to Proceed (elective)
 - c. Dispositions in Juvenile Justice (elective)
 - d. The Intersection of Child Welfare and Juvenile Justice (elective)
 - e. Neuroeducation Curriculum for Juvenile Justice Professionals (elective)
- 4. Continue to preside over juvenile delinquency matters. The Chief District Court Judge must certify to the AOC that the judge is meeting this requirement.

MAINTAINING CERTIFICATION

The requirement for maintaining Advanced Certification in Juvenile Justice is the same as the requirement to maintain juvenile court certification. A judge must complete six hours of continuing judicial education in each biennium at courses administered by the North Carolina Judicial College at the UNC School of Government or at the Summer or Fall Judges' Conference of the North Carolina Association of District Court Judges. Faculty of the North Carolina Judicial College shall designate qualified courses. These six hours may include designated courses that also are counted toward the twenty-four hours required of a Family Court Judge. Hours shall be submitted by the judge to the AOC.
