


North Carolina by County Population

A Different Way of Seeing North Carolina

This large map of North Carolina is actually a “cartogram,” a map in which the sizes of counties have been rescaled according to their population. It visually communicates what many people already know: that a large part of the state’s population resides in the arc of counties between Mecklenburg and Wake. The cartogram adds to readers’ numerical understanding of the difference between Mecklenburg County’s population of 752,366

and Tyrrell County’s population of 4,156. The ten most populous counties in the state account for 4 out of 10 residents (41.2 percent), and five of these counties—Buncombe, Cumberland, Gaston, New Hanover, and Onslow—are outside the Mecklenburg-Wake arc. Thirteen of the state’s 100 counties have populations under 15,000, and fifty have populations under 50,000.
