1. OUTSIDE ACTIVITIES

As judges, you are both elected/appointed officials and members of the communities you serve. As a result, it is generally understood and encouraged that you are involved in leadership opportunities.

- With this being said, please understand your limits:
 - Under the Code "Can I do this?"
- Personally "Should I do this?"

Canon 4 – quasi-judicial

<u>Canon 5</u> – extra-judicial (volunteer work & outside business ventures)

<u>Canon 7</u> – political realm

1. Outside Activities: Can I Do This?

Considerations under the Code:

- Belonging to groups that may cast doubt on your impartiality (Canon 3C).

 Groups that regularly appear before you.

 Groups that support a particular class of litigants.

 Engaging in financial/business dealings contrary to the limitations outlined in Canon 5C(1)

 Actively soliciting for organizations in fundraising activities (Canons 4C, 5B(2), 7B(3)).

 Neglecting your judicial duties by spending too much time on extracurriculars (Canon 3)

- Practicing law (Canon 5F)
- Making public statements about pending cases (Canon 3A(6)) and/or taking stances that may cause your impartiality to be questioned (Canon 3C).

 Misusing the prestige of your office or otherwise abusing your power (Canon 2B)
- Being listed as an "officer, director, or manager" of a business or otherwise managing the finances of a non-relative (Canon 5C(2))
- May identify as a member of a political party and attend political events, including fundraisers (Canon 7B(1)), but cannot donate to individual candidates (Canon 7B(3)) or endorse, unless a candidate (Canon 7B(2))



1. Outside Activities: Should I Do This?

As judges, you are going to be asked to serve in many different capacities in your communities.

- You cannot, and likely should not, do them all.
 - Work, family, other extra-curricular activities, etc.
- Ultimately, only you know what you can handle.
 - Be honest with yourself.
 - o Pick things you are passionate about.
 - o Decide how important it is for you to be involved & to what degree you wish to be.
 - Beware of burnout.

2. Addressing Misconduct

Canon 3B administrative duty to address attorney misconduct, but how?

Who is best suited to handle this? State Bar vs. Judge

 Considerations: severity of misconduct, where misconduct occurred, pattern vs. isolated incident, time of response, where you are in addressing case

You have options:

 Private conversation, verbal warning, removal from appointed lists, report to State Bar, contempt/sanctions, initiation of disciplinary proceedings

- Ensure your jurisdiction has a system to handle:
 MARs
 - General inmate correspondence
 - o Orders from the appellate courts contact info up to date with Clerks' Offices
- Repeat filers

Canon 3C - Recusals

- Duty to hear cases
- Subjective <u>and</u> objective inquiry
- Default should be to stay in a case unless there is a reason you can point to that would require your recusal

 ${\bf Canons~1,2A,3A(1)}$ - being faithful to the law; public's confidence in the judiciary

o Rotate, follow assigned commissions, be present/available
