TB Laws



G.S. 90-85.34A Public Health Pharmacy Practice

- Medication must be listed in DHHS
 Formulary & approved by the Board
- Must have pharmacy permit (G.S. 90-85.21)
- Written procedures exist
- Nurse must have had approved training
- Pharmacy oversight at least weekly

10A NCAC 41A .0205 TST Required

- Suspects, contacts, cases
- DOC inmates & DOC employees w/ direct inmate contact
- LTC residents and employees
- HIV positive individuals
- Adult Daycare employees who take care of HIV/Aids patients

10A NCAC 41A .0103 Reporting requirements

- Suspected communicable diseases (includes all forms of tuberculosis) within 24 hours
 - Providers, hospitals, other healthcare agencies are required to report to the health department
 - Health department is required to report to the state

G.S. 130A-144 Tuberculosis Disease Treatment

- All persons known or reasonably suspected of having a communicable disease must comply with control measures and submit to examination and testing
- "the local health department shall provide, at no cost to the patient, the examination and treatment for tuberculosis disease.."

G.S. 90-21.5 Minor Consent

- Minors may consent to prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of any disease reportable under G.S. 130A-135
- Parental consent is not required for TST of contacts, x-ray of positive children, or treatment of TB infection or disease

G.S. 130A-145 Isolation and Quarantine

- We recommend use of a voluntary TB Treatment Agreement, however,
- Issuance of an Isolation and Quarantine Order may be required to protect the public's health in the event the patient refuses to comply with requests to curtail public interaction

GS 130A – 143 Maintaining Confidentiality

- Worksite or school investigations
- Persons in other agencies

10A NCAC 41A .0103(a) Investigation

• "immediately investigate the circumstances surrounding the occurrence of disease or condition..."

15A-534.5 Detention to protect the public health

• Used to keep infectious, non compliant persons off the street and on treatment

G.S. 130A-25 Health Law Violator

- Misdemeanor, imprisonment for up to 2 years (males in McCain, females in NC Correctional Center for Women)
 - Criteria for release is also specified in this general statute

Incarceration Procedure

- Should be considered a last resort
- Health Director must consult with county attorney, Judge, District Attorney, and Public Defender regarding the legal steps
- To assure immediate sentencing PD must be assigned to HLV as soon as arrest warrant is issued
- County is charged per diem if not sentenced

15A-534.S Detention to protect public health

- Clear & convincing evidence of threat to public's health
- Pretrial confinement
- Must have recommendation from state or local health director

Arrest Procedure

- Health Director and/or county attorney request magistrate to swear out arrest warrant
- Sheriff's department arrests HLV
- HLV is sentenced "for duration of TB disease treatment or up to 2 years"
- HD or sheriff notifies DOC of HLV
- HD sends all medical information & x-ray

Release Procedure

- One month prior to expected completion date prison MD will initiate letter with recommendations for early release to NC TB Control, Medical director DOC
- State TB MD writes (and signs) letter
- State Health Director reviews & signs letter
- Letter to LHD who prepares a release letter for the judge hand carry to district court
- Same Judge must issue release decree
