COMMUNICATING EFFECTIVELY WITH THE LEGISLATIVE BRANCH OF GOVERNMENT

PLAN IN ADVANCE

What you can do before your meeting that can make a difference...

KNOW WHO THE PLAYERS ARE

Which party is in control of each house?
Leadership is the key
What committees matter?
Players outside the General Assembly
Fiscal and Research Staff

KNOW THE ISSUES FACING THE LEGISLATURE

Session always revolves around the budget
 Understand the process
 Know the status of budget proposals and negotiations
 Budget discussions are ALWAYS taking place

KNOW THE ISSUES FACING THE LEGISLATURE

Let your audience know that you are engaged in what is going on "downtown" what are the hot topics

 Exception: controversy and scandals – stay away from even if asked
 "I don't know enough about the circumstances to comment"

UNDERSTAND YOUR TOPIC AND COME PREPARED

- Why is your issue important or more important?
- Prepare talking points
 - Provide the ammunition the legislator will need to convince his/her colleagues
 - Need the knowledge to make the decision when the time comes

UNDERSTAND YOUR TOPIC AND COME PREPARED

What do you want to accomplish?
A "yes" vote
Coalition builder
Education is the key
Be accurate with your information
I do not know is an OK response – offer to find out and follow up

UNDERSTAND YOUR TOPIC AND COME PREPARED

Anticipate responses and questions
Know who you are competing against
You may not be well received
What is everyone else saying?

BRING MATERIALS THAT YOU CAN LEAVE

Talking points

Short and to the point

■ No more than two pages

Most legislators do not have staff

- The players, again
- The committee process, again
 Negotiations ("Room 612")
 Conference Report
- Reasons for disagreement
- "Rules"

Avoid "meal meetings"Who pays?

KNOW YOUR LEGISLATOR Know something personal ■ Anything personal in common? -College, Kids, Friends Both elected officials ■ You both understand what it means to run for office ■ Same constituents ■ Be polite and then get to the issue: "I am here to discuss..."

KNOW YOUR LEGISLATOR

What party?
Role and standing in the caucus/party
Committees and position
Friend or foe?
Other Key Relationships –

Campaign supporters
Outside Raleigh

OTHER THINGS TO REMEMBER

- Use personal experiences and stories
- Don't assume the legislator knows anything
- Thank the legislator for meeting with you
- "I understand that you have a difficult job and that you have to make difficult decisions."

Before, during and after

Education is the key
Don't threaten or insult (ethics)
Take time to sum up your meeting
What can I do for you
Write a thank you letter
