Quick Reference: Reporting Elder Abuse

Several state and federal laws require reporting related to suspected abuse, neglect, and exploitation of older adults. This reference guide is designed to provide a high-level overview of these laws. The guide has three parts:

- Table 1 includes summaries of the reporting requirements.
- Table 2 includes contact phone numbers for all 100 county social services agencies.
- Table 3 lists some of the crimes that are subject to the specific reporting requirement applicable to employees and volunteers in mental health, developmental disability, and substance abuse facilities.

Table 1. Summary of Mandatory Reporting Obligations

Who Reports?	Where to Report?	When to Report?
Almost everyone	County DSS	 Any person (with one limited exception described below) who has reasonable cause to believe that a disabled a adult is in need of services to protect the adult from abuse, neglect, or exploitation must file a report with the county department of social services (DSS).
		 Reports must be made to the social services agency in the county where the adult either (1) resides or (2) is present. See Table 2, below, for contact information for each county's agency.
		■ The only exception to this reporting requirement applies to the regional staff working with the State Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program, which provides advocacy for long-term care facility residents. They may report abuse, neglect, or exploitation to DSS with the consent of either (1) the affected resident or (2) the State Ombudsman.
County DSS	District attorney	If, in the course of an adult protective services evaluation, DSS finds evidence that an adult has been abused, neglected, or exploited, DSS must notify the district attorney.
		 The notice must be in writing and must include the specific findings from the evaluation.^c

The term "disabled adult" is defined to mean "any person 18 years of age or over or any lawfully emancipated minor who is present in the State of North Carolina and who is physically or mentally incapacitated due to an intellectual disability, cerebral palsy, epilepsy or autism; organic brain damage caused by advanced age or other physical degeneration in connection therewith; or due to conditions incurred at any age which are the result of accident, organic brain damage, mental or physical illness, or continued consumption or absorption of substances." Financial institution (1 of 3)	Trusted person	 Under state law, financial institutions are encouraged to offer disabled adults and older adults an opportunity to submit to the institutions a list of "trusted persons" and to update the lists periodically. If the institution has reasonable cause to believe 	
		 that the adult is the victim or target of financial exploitation, 	
		it must report the suspicion to any "trusted person" identified by the customer , <i>unless</i> the institution "suspects that [the trusted person is] financially exploiting the disabled adult or older adult." ^d	
Financial institution (2 of 3)	FinCEN	 If a financial institution knows, suspects, or has reason to suspect that a transaction conducted or attempted by, at, or through the institution involves funds derived from illegal activity or attempts to disguise funds derived from illegal activity, is designed to evade regulations promulgated under the Bank Secrecy Act (BSA), lacks a business or apparent lawful purpose, or involves the use of the financial institution to facilitate a criminal activity, the institution may be required to submit a suspicious activity report (SAR) to the federal government. SARs are submitted electronically to the Financial Crimes Enforcement Network (FinCEN) within the U.S. Department of the Treasury.^e

Financial Institution (3 of 3)	Local law enforcement	 If a financial institution (including officers and employees) has reasonable cause to believe that a disabled adult or older adult (aged 65 years and older) is the victim or target of financial exploitation, the institution must make a report to local law enforcement.
		Note that if the adult is disabled, the financial institution must make two reports in this situation: one to law enforcement and one to the county DSS (see above).
Employees and volunteers at MH/DD/SA treatment facilities ^f (1 of 2)	Authorized personnel	 If an employee or volunteer at an MH/DD/SA facility witnesses another employee or volunteer knowingly causing pain or injury to a client (other than as a part of generally accepted medical or therapeutic procedure) the witness must report the incident to authorized personnel designated by the facility. The facility should have policies and procedures in place to identify the person or position authorized to receive these reports. Note that if the adult is disabled, the employee or volunteer must make two reports in this situation: one to the authorized personnel and one to the county DSS (see above). If DSS determines that the case does not involve a disabled adult or abuse, neglect, or exploitation, as those terms are defined

Employees and volunteers at MH/DD/SA treatment facilities (2 of 2)	County DSS, law enforcement, or district attorney	 If an employee or volunteer at an MH/DD/SA facility witnesses a client becoming a victim of one of many specific crimes, most of which involve sexual violence or abuse, he or she must make a report within twenty-four hours. Reports may be made to the county DSS, law enforcement, or the district attorney. Note that if the adult is disabled, the employee must make a report to the county DSS (see above). This report would satisfy both reporting obligations (the general reporting duty and the MH/DD/SA specific reporting duty). If DSS determines that the case does not involve a disabled adult or abuse, neglect, or exploitation, as those terms are defined in G.S. 108A-101, DSS may screen out the report.
Physicians, hospitals, and other medical facilities ^k	Law enforcement	 Reporting is required when a health care provider treats a person who has a wound, injury, or illness that arises from or is caused by the discharge of a gun or firearm (or appears to have so arisen from or been caused by); an illness that is apparently caused by poisoning; a wound or injury that is caused by or apparently caused by a knife or sharp or pointed instrument if it appears to the provider that a criminal act was involved; or any wound, injury, or illness in which there is grave bodily harm or grave illness if it appears to the provider, that it resulted from a criminal act of violence. The report must be made as soon as practicable to local law enforcement police within a municipality or sheriff if not within a municipality).
