

# N.C. Local Health Departments, Directors, & Boards

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NC law requires counties to provide public health service:



"A county shall provide public health services." G.S. 130A-<u>34</u>

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# Every county has:

Local health department	A single-county or multi-county agency that provides public health services (AKA local public health agency)
Local board of health	A board empowered to exercise the legal powers and duties of a board of health (AKA governing board)
Local health director	<ul> <li>An employee and officer of the department who meets certain education &amp; experience criteria and who is authorized to carry out powers and duties prescribed by law</li> </ul>

NC law establishes four types of local health department




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# The department type determines the type of board of health (BOH)

Department type	BOH type	N.C. laws
County health department	County board of health (appointed), or	G.S. 130A-35
	Board of county commissioners serves as board of health and appoints an advisory committee	G.S. 153A-77(a)
District (multi-county) health department	District board of health (appointed)	G.S. 130A-37
Consolidated human services agency	Consolidated human services (CHS) board (appointed), or	G.S. 153A-77(c)
	Board of county commissioners serves as CHS board and appoints an advisory committee	G.S. 153A-77(a)
Public health authority	Public health authority board	G.S. 130A-45.1





#### Essential Public Health Services in NC law

NC law incorporates the pre-2020 essential public health services in two ways:

 Each local health department is responsible for assuring these essential services.
 G.S. 130A-1.1.

 NC local health department accreditation criteria are based on these essential services.
 G.S. 130A-34.1.



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### Mandated services

### What education & experience is required to be a local health director?

A local health director must have a medical doctorate or one of the following combinations of education and experience: • Master's in public health administration and one year experience in health programs or services; • Master's in other public health discipline and three years' experience in health programs/services; • Master's in public administration and two years' experience in health programs/services; • Master's in field related to public health and three years' experience in health programs/services; • Baschelor's in public health administration or public administration and three years' experience in health programs/services.




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# Local health director powers and duties



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# NC law prescribes a board of health's role and gives it its powers and duties



#### Role: Protect and promote the public health Powers and duties include:

- Adopt local public health rules (AKA board of health rules)
   Adjudicate disputes regarding local public health rules
   Make policy for local public health agency
- Make policy for local public health agency
   Impose local public health fees
   Satisfy state accreditation requirements for BOHs
- Satisfy state accreditation requirements for BOHs
   Appoint the local health director, unless the agency is a CHSA

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# Advisory committee on health

When a board of county commissioners (BOCC) assumes the powers and duties of a board of health, or of a consolidated human services board that includes public health, the BOCC must appoint an advisory committee on health.



- Advisory committee membership must include:
- County commissioner
   Physician
- Dentist
- Optometrist
- Veterinarian
- Registered nurse
   Pharmacist
- Professional engineer
- Three members of general public

Division of duties between a board of county commissioners that has assumed BOH powers/duties and the advisory committee on health

#### BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

Make policy for local health department

Adjudicate disputes about local rules Impose local public health fees Non-delegable activities of boards of health tha are required by the North Carolina Local Health Department Accreditation Standards

Adopt local public health rules

Advise on public health matters Carry out activities that may be delegated to advisory committees under the North Carolina Local Health Department Accreditation Standards

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NC local boards of health adopt rules that are necessary to protect & promote public health

"A local board of health shall have the responsibility to protect and promote the public health. The board of health shall have the authority to adopt rules necessary for that purpose." G.S. 130A-39





# What is a BOH rule and what can it do?

In order to protect or promote the health of the public, a BOH rule may:

 Prohibit people from taking certain actions, or
 Require people to take certain actions.

 Require people to take certain actions.
 A BOH rule is an *administrative* action that is authorized by state law and subject to limits imposed by state laws.

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
A local rule may be more stringent than state public health rules if necessary to protect public health

General Rule

A BOH may adopt a rule in an area already regulated by the Commission for Public Health or the Environmental Management Commission if:

 The local rule is <u>more stringent</u> than the state rules; and
 The POUL determines that a more

 The BOH determines that a more stringent local rule is <u>required</u> to protect public health.

# Notice of rulemaking

A board of health must provide the public at least 10 days' notice of the board's intent to adopt, amend, or repeal a board of health rule. Ten days before proposed rulemaking action:

n days before proposed rulemaking action: Give the county clerk a copy of the new rule, the amended rule, or the resolution to repeal a rule; Publish a notice in a newspaper with general circulation in the jurisdiction that states the substance of the proposed action and the proposed effective date, and that tells the public that copies are available at the health department. Make copies available at the health department.

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Type of enforcement action	Consequence	Local rules that may be enforced this way
Civil	Injunction (court order)	Any local BOH rule
Criminal	Misdemeanor	Any local BOH rule except rules regulating smoking in public places
	Infraction	Only local BOH rules regulating smoking in public places
Administrative penalty	Monetary fine	Only local BOH rules addressing on-site wastewater

Local BOH rules have the "force of law"

BOH rules may be legally enforced against those who do not comply using public health remedies that are prescribed in law.



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### Local Board of Health Adjudications

Jurisdiction: Local boards of health hear appeals of only two types of actions: • The endrocement of local board of health rules • The imposition of administrative penalties (fines) by the local health director

Timelines: The timeline starts running when the health department employee or health director takes the action that prompts the appeal. • 30 days to expend: The aggregate dperson has 30 calendar days to give notice of appeal. The notice must be in writing and include certain information.

5 days to provide notice and information to the board: The local health director then must transmit the notice of appeal to the board of health along with additional relevant materials within 5 working days. Long introduction became and the second s



## Local Board of Health Adjudications

 Hearing and Decision:
 The board must hold the hearing and then reach a decision based on the evidence presented. The board's decision may affirm, modify, or reverse the health department's action.

The board must issue a written decision with a concise statement of the reasons for the decision. Legal Assistance:

The health director should notify the department's attorney immediately when notice of appeal is received. The board of health should work with the attorney in conducting the hearing and preparing the written decision.
