Addiction

- A disease
- Characterized by continuous or periodic lack of control over use of drug or alcohol
- Preoccupation with substances
- Continued use despite adverse consequences
- · Distortions in thinking and denial

Principles of Effective Treatment · Address things that can be changed • Therapeutic integrity of program · Targeting of offenders · Services targeted to learning styles and abilities of offenders **Evaluating Treatment Programs** • Are they designed to target specific characteristics and problems of offenders? • Do they use appropriate therapeutic techniques? • Is the staff trained? • Are programs evaluated? • Is the length of treatment sufficient? • Is most intensive treatment targeted at most serious offenders? • Does the program use cognitive behavioral treatment methods? Sentencing Offenders • What do you say to offenders? • How do you react to failure of a defendant while in treatment?

- Judge involvement
- Rules and structure for treatment
- Team approach
