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STRENGTHS AND WEAKNESSES OF NC'S LEGAL FRAMEWORK

- Variety of legal tools available to help older adults
- Mandatory reporting
- Recently updated laws related to financial institutions



- Reports to DSS
- Reports to law enforcement
- Reports to federal government (financial)

MANDATORY REPORTING



- Laws updated to harmonize state law with federal law to clarify authority to report and share records with DSS and law enforcement

- Fragmented system
- No specific law authorizing MDTs
- APS laws viewed as incomplete or antiquated
- Confidentiality laws inhibit information sharing



• Georgia

- Authorizes district attorney to establish MDTs
- Allows information sharing among team members and makes information confidential

Texas

- Requires large counties to have MDTs; mandates membership
- Authorizes government agencies to share information with one another and also with community providers involved

South Carolina

Authorizes APS to adopt regulations, policies, and MOUs related to investigations

- Case review Child and Family Teams, Permanency Planning Reviews
 - Review active cases; child in custody of social services
- Systemic review Community Child Protection Teams
 - Review selected active cases
 - Review fatalities connected to CPS
 - Make recommendations for system change

APS LAWS - EXAMPLES

CHILD PROTECTIVE

- Access to records: Expansive authority to demand access to any and all information necessary to evaluate a report
- Duration: Authority to provide services for an extended period of time (years)

ADULT PROTECTIVE

- Access to records: Limited authority to demand access to some records from some involved with an adult's care
- Duration: Maximum of 120 days if adult lacks capacity to consent; guardianship becomes default if extended services necessary

CONFIDENTIALITY

- Patchwork of disconnected confidentiality laws
- Confusion and concern
- Default is to withhold



CONFIDENTIALITY

- **Social services**: Limited authority to share with law enforcement and health care providers involved with investigation or providing services
- Health care providers: Duty to report; unclear how far authority extends after report without being compelled
- Financial institutions: Duty to report; authority to share with law enforcement and social services
