





























### Place of Secure Custody


Any youth under juvenile jurisdiction must be housed in a juvenile detention facility\*



















# Can order these dispositions only for juveniles under 18 1. Supervision in own home by DSS, JCC, or other 2. Placement in custody of parent, guardian, custodian, relative, private agency, or other suitable person 3. Placement in DSS custody






## Disposition — Criminal Gang Activity Mirrors definitions in criminal law 14-50.16A (NC Criminal Gang Suppression Act) Act) Commission, attempted commission, solicitation, coercion, or intimidation of another person to commit: (1)Any offense under the controlled substances act; OR (2) Any criminal offense (per Chapter 14), with some listed exceptions (2)Participants in offense are identified as criminal gang; or collectively to further any criminal configuration of collectively to further any criminal purpose of a criminal gang



JJRA and Other Statutes

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### New Delinquent Acts at 16/17

§ 14-12.7. Wearing of masks, hoods, etc., on public ways. § 14-12.9. Entry, etc., upon premises of another while wearing mask, hood or other disguise.

§ 14-12.10. Holding meetings or demonstrations while wearing masks, hoods, etc.

§ 14-74. Larceny by servants and other employees. § 14-90. Embezzlement of property received by virtue of office or employment.

§ 14-178. Incest. § 14-202.1. Taking indecent liberties with children.

§ 14-202.3. Solicitation of child by computer or certain other electronic devices to commit an unlawful sex act.

The following provisions of the North Carolina Criminal Gang Suppression Act:

- § 14-50.17. Soliciting; encouraging participation.
- § 14-50.18. Soliciting; encouraging participation; minor.
- § 14-50.19. Intimidation to deter from gang withdrawal.
- § 14-50.20. Punishment or retaliation for gang withdrawal.


Age threshold for contributing to the delinquency of a minor raised to 18 (G.S. 14-316.1)

Contempt by a minor will include those under 18 (G.S. 5A-31(a))




