Youth Street Gang Data

- **•**1992 1997
 - •13 cities reporting gang presence
- **-2009**
 - •78% counties
 - •1,000 gangs and 9,000 gang involved youth
- **-2025**
 - 4,000 validated gangs
 - •Forecasts 50% of gang members between the ages of 18-25
 - •100 counties reported youth gang presence

Important New Findings

- Suspected juvenile gang crime has increased 47.9% in 5 years
- Gang-involved at-risk youth have more mental health problems than other at-risk youth (44% to 33%).
- Approximately 30% of juvenile detention stays were for youth who are identified as gang involved.
- Of the 1,054 gang involved youth, a large number have family and friend relationships that show traumatic factors

Features of "Hybrid" Gangs

- Mixture of graffiti and symbols (cut-and-paste)
- Mixed race / ethnicity
- May belong to more than one gang
- Sometimes switch from one gang to another
- Less concern over turf or territory

National Gangs

- •Two main youth street gang designations:
 - Folk Nation and People Nation
 - Two designations occurred in prison
 - In 1979, no individual gang controlled the prison system. . . which led to allegiance between gangs

- People Nation (left)
 - Latin Kings
 - Bloods
 - Vice Lords
 - El Rukins
 - Pachucos

- Folk Nation (right)
 - Black Gangsta Disciples
 - Crips
 - Black Disciples

What can judges do?

Robe On vs. Robe Off

Robe On: Prevention & Intervention

- Encourage therapeutic / rehabilitation over strict punishment
- Establish regular court reviews to monitor compliance to ordered interventions
- Order community-based corrections
 - Mandatory school attendance
 - Diagnostic & psychiatric treatment
 - Family services / counseling

Robe On: Prevention & Intervention

 Delay sentencing (final disposition) for positive behavior

Issue court orders for rehabilitation

 Support colleagues in evolving corrections mindset

Robe Off: Prevention & Intervention

Lead community mobilization efforts

Advocate for community resources

Promote interagency information sharing

Robe Off: Prevention & Intervention

 Design opportunities for new judges to gain a deeper understanding of risk factors

Initiate programs for gang-prone youth

Creative Intervention Considerations

- Gang renunciation program to re-construct identity
- Job Apprenticeship / Entrepreneurship development
- Leadership development
- Weekend & afterschool programming
- "Find the hook"
