Drug charges were the most frequent type of crime (22%) committed by new entries to probation in 2013, followed by driving while impaired (16%), larceny (15%), and assault (10%). The majority of parole entries during 2013 were 'Not Reported or Undefined' (17%), driving while impaired (15%). Other crimes were drug, non-trafficking (13%), robbery (10%), and assault (9%). The most frequent crime category for post-release supervision cases was robbery (15%). Other crimes were drug, non-trafficking (14%), assault (10%), breaking and entering (10%), and habitual felons (10%).
