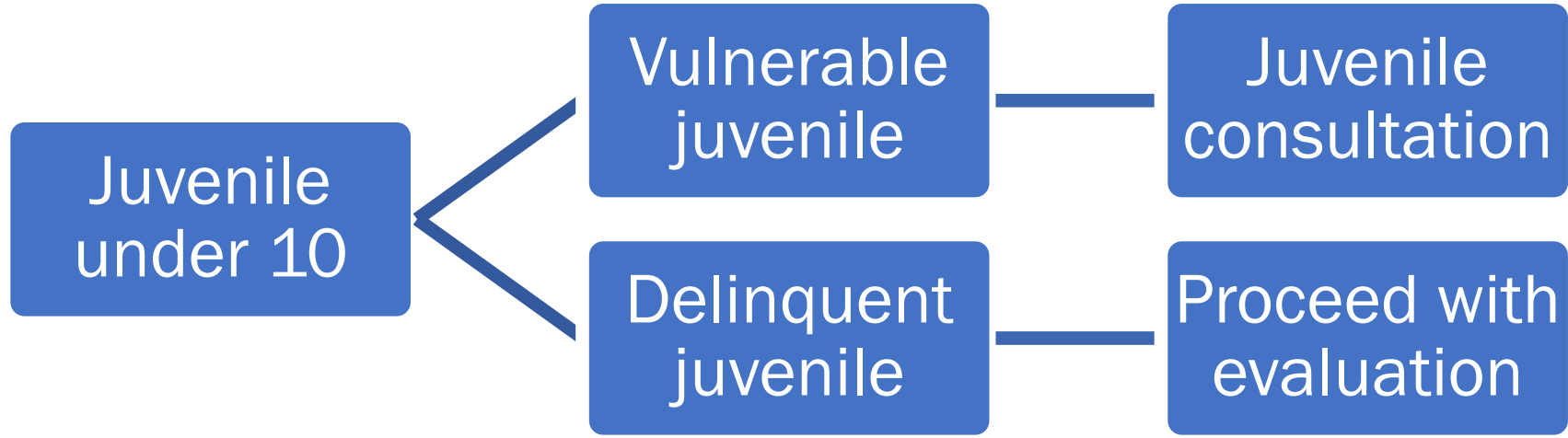

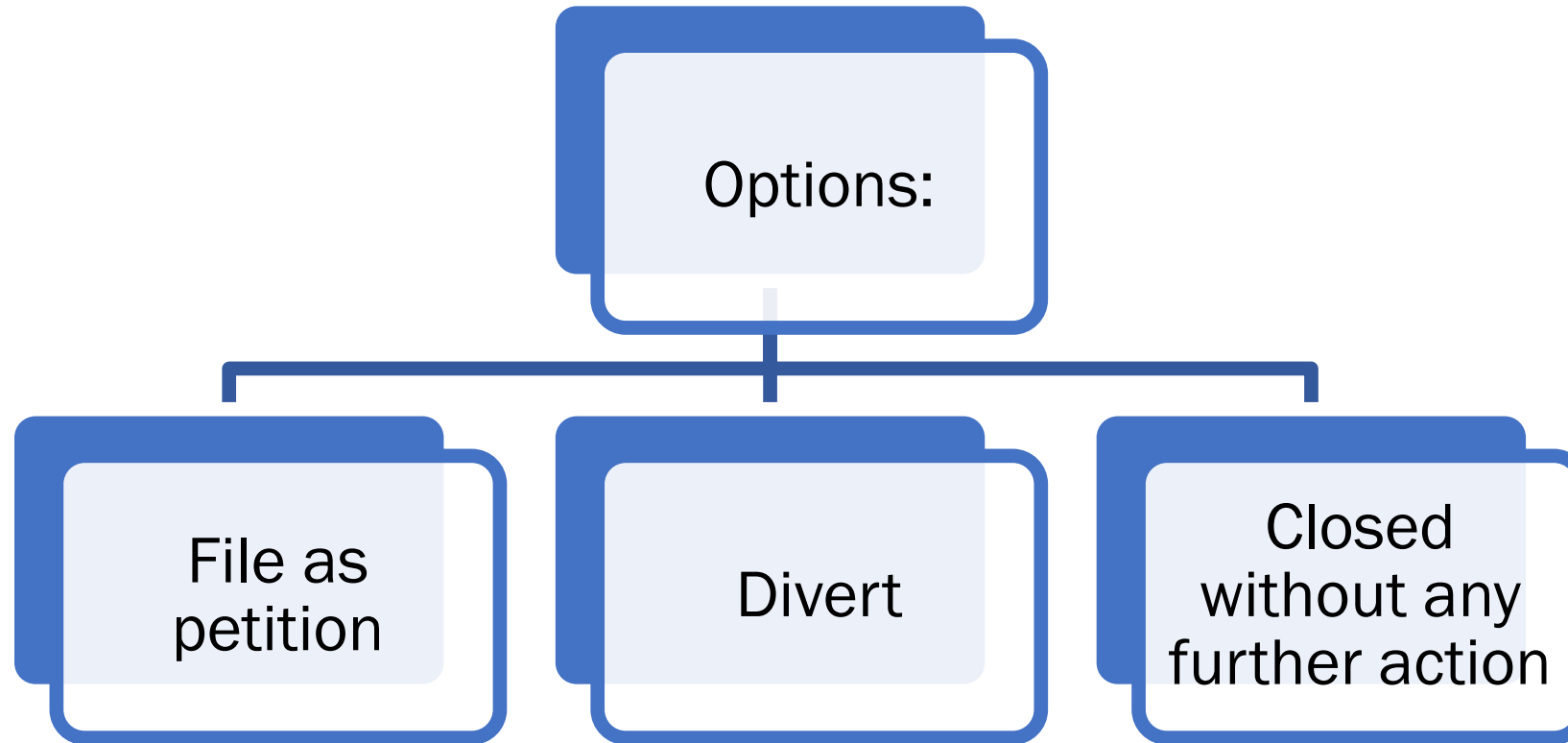


# Nondivertible Offenses

MUST file petition if there are reasonable grounds to believe the juvenile committed:

- *Murder;*
- *First-degree or second-degree rape;*
- *First-degree or second-degree sexual offense;*
- *Arson;*
- *Any violation of Article 5, Chapter 90 of the General Statutes that would constitute a felony if committed by an adult;*
- *First degree burglary;*
- *Crime against nature;*
- *Any felony which involves the willful infliction of serious bodily injury or was committed by use of a deadly weapon.*

# Evaluation Process (G.S. 7B-1702)

- If practicable, interviews with:
  - *The complainant and the victim,*
  - *The juvenile and their parent, guardian, or custodian,*
  - *People known to have relevant information about the juvenile or their family*
- GAIN-Short Screener (GAIN-SS) for youth 12 and older
- Youth Assessment & Screening Instrument (YASI)
- Gang assessment for age 12 and older






## Intake Decision Criteria



- Protection of the community;
- The seriousness of the offense;
- The juvenile's previous record of involvement with the legal system, including previous diversions;
- The juvenile's behavior at home, in school, and in the community.
- The ability of the juvenile and the juvenile's family to use resources;
- Consideration of the victim;
- The juvenile's age; and
- The juvenile's culpability in the alleged complaint.

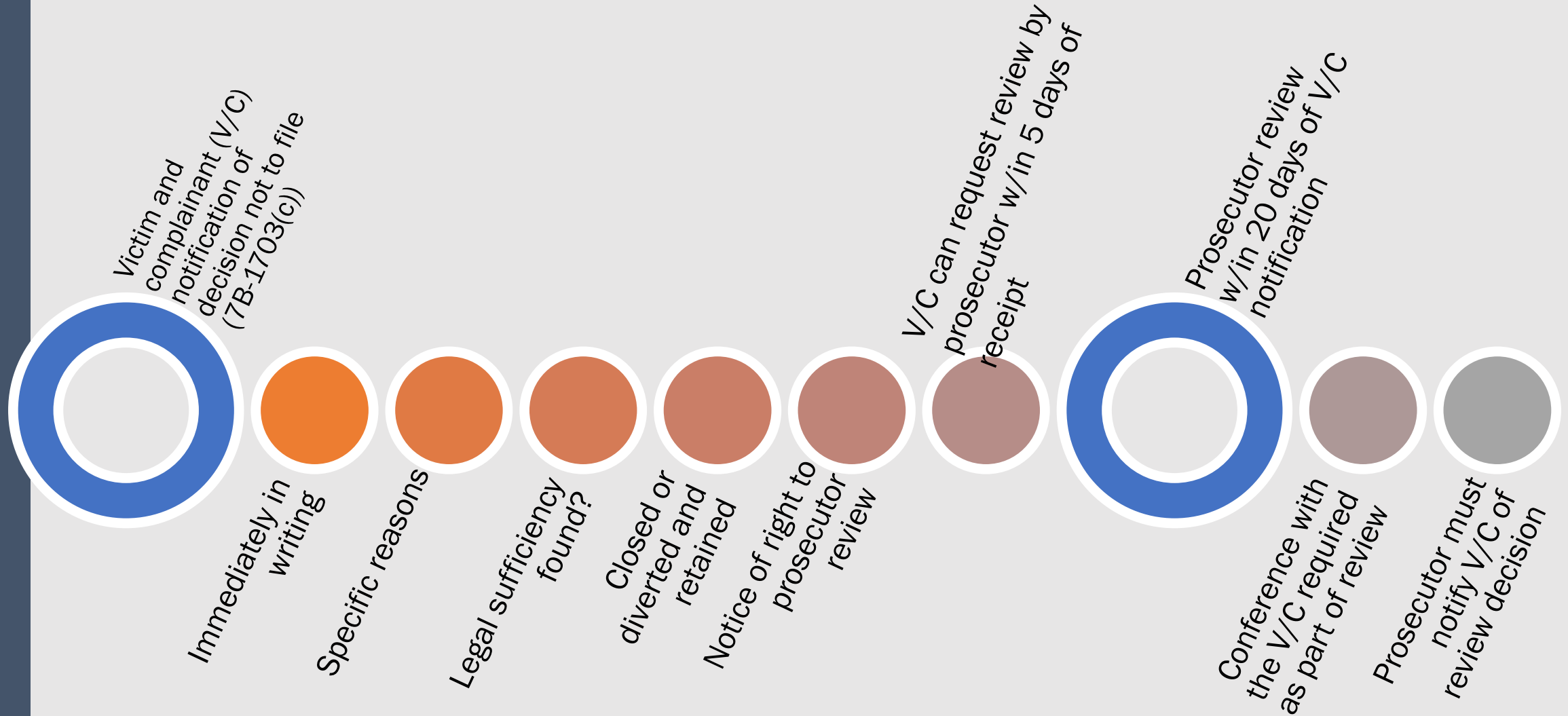


# Evaluation Timeline

## G.S. 7B-1703

- Complete within 15 days of receipt of complaint
- Chief court counselor can extend for 15 more days
- Same timeline applies to filing a petition

# Prosecutor Review of Decision Not to File a Petition (G.S. 1703(c), -1704, -1705)



# Diversion (G.S. 7B-1706)

Can last up to 6 months

Noncompliance at any time may result in the filing of a petition



## Diversion Contracts / Plans

- A Diversion is an opportunity for the youth to correct behaviors without court intervention.
- A Diversion Plan or Contract may include:
  - *use of community resources including mental health services;*
  - *restitution;*
  - *community service;*
  - *victim-offender reconciliation;*
  - *teen court; etc.*





## Diversion, cont.

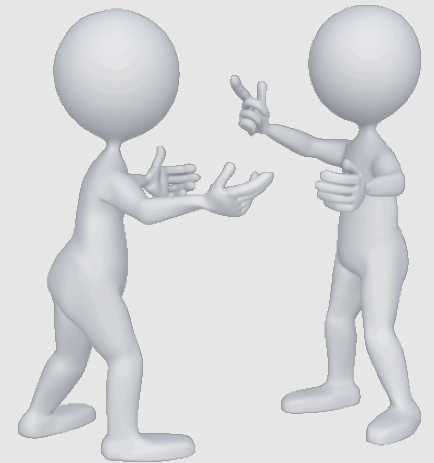
- A court counselor may enter into a “diversion contract” with the juvenile and the parent, guardian or custodian when it is determined that a higher degree of accountability is required
- A Diversion Contract is a written agreement





## Diversion Follow-Up

- Within 10 days, counselor must determine whether juvenile and parent are complying with diversion conditions
- Counselor may monitor the diversion for up to six months maintaining regular contact at least every 30 days
- Must retain the contract until juvenile is 18 years old or out of the court's jurisdiction, whichever is later
- Petition may be filed if juvenile does not comply with conditions

## Pre-Court Ordered Services

- Preparation of the Court Reports
- Facilitation of Court Hearings
- Facilitation of Secure Custody Services
- Provision of Alternative to Detention (ATD) services
- Case tracking and case management as needed

# Juvenile Consultation Services (G.S. 7B-1706.1)

6 months, with possible 3-month extension

Case management services

- Screenings
- Assessments
- Community resources
- Programming

For juvenile and the parent, guardian, or custodian



reminders.....

- Juvenile Justice is part of the NC Executive Branch
