Misdemeanor Sentencing

- What counts for prior record points?
 - PJC always counts (felony or misdemeanor)
 - Infractions and juvenile adjudications never count



Prayer for Judgment Continued

- Three types
 - Final resolution of a case
 - From term to term for a set period
 - To await additional information for sentencing

Prayer for Judgment Continued

- If the PJC includes conditions that are punishment, it's not a PJC
 - It's entry of judgment, and no further punishment may be imposed
- · What amounts to punishment?
 - No: Costs only; requirement to "obey the law"
 - Yes: Fine, jail, restitution, community service, treatment

Prayer for Judgment Continued

 You <u>must</u> enter judgment in DWI cases and speeding in excess of 25 mph

- Must have consent of the State, the defendant, and YOU to enter H/I felony plea in district court
- Revocation hearing can be in district court with consent of State and defendant
- Appeal of revocation is to superior court

Felony Sentencing

- Watch out for stipulations to "substantial similarity" of out-of-state convictions
 - Defendant can't stipulate to a question of law
 - Palmateer and many other recent cases

Extending Probation: Illustration

- 1 Feb 2001: 36-month probation begins
- 1 Feb 2004: probation set to expire
- 26 Feb 2004: dei prant consents to 24month extension (o Feb 2006)
- 9 January 2006: Seendant consents to another 24-month extension (to Feb 2008)
- Probation revoke in 30 April 2007

Extending Probation: Special

- Extension by up to 3 years beyond the original period if:
 - Probationer consents;
 - During last 6 months of original period; and
 - Extension is for <u>restitution</u> or <u>medical or</u> <u>psychiatric treatment</u>
- This is the only way probation may extend beyond 5 years

UNC

Intermediate Punishment

- Supervised probation + at least one of:
 - Special probation (split sentence)
 - Residential program
 - Electronic House Arrest
 - Day Reporting Center
 - Drug Treatment Court
 - Intensive probation





Special Probation

- Total active component capped at ¼ the maximum sentence imposed
- Active portions must be complete within 2 years of conviction
- Pretrial confinement credit: your choice
 - Credit to the active portion of the split, or
 - Credit to the suspended sentence

Domestic Violence Treatment

- A regular condition of probation for domestic violence offenders
 - Attend a Domestic Violence Commission approved treatment program
 - Unless you decide "not in the best interests of justice"

UNC

Sex Crimes

- Mandatory conditions for sex offenders and crimes involving abuse of a minor
 - Sexual abuse: not reside in household with a minor
 - Physical or mental abuse: only reside in household with minor if abuse unlikely and in minor's best interest
- Sex offender control program

G.S. 90-96

- Conditional discharge for drug offenses
- · Anyone who pleads or is found guilty of:
 - Mdm possession of Sched II through VI CS
 - Drug paraphernalia
 - Felony possession of less than 1 g. cocaine
- Probation without entry of judgment, typically with drug education school
- If successful, charge dismissed
- Defendants under 22 eligible for expunction

Probation Violation Hearings

- Preliminary hearings
 - Within 7 working days of arrest, to determine PC
 - Only required if detained on PV only
 - If not held within 7 working days, release probationer
- Probably can be done by district court judge, even in superior court cases
- Many probationers probably entitled to counsel

Probation Violation Hearings

- Final violation hearing
 - Counsel
 - Waiver of counsel must comply with G.S. 15A-1242. Common error!
 - State v. Jackson (2008)

Types of Violations

- Failure to pay money—be sure to consider good faith inability to pay
- Absconding—defined by DCC regulation
- New crimes:
 - Don't revoke probation based on a "charge"
 - Don't revoke probation after an acquittal
 - Don't revoke probation solely for Class 3 mdm

Your Options at the Hearing

- Continue
- Modify: Upon violation, you may add Intermediate conditions
- Extend
- Contempt: Requires plenary proceeding
- · Terminate: You can do this any time
- Revoke

Options at Revocation

- You may reduce the suspended sentence
- Revoking judge may choose to run the activated sentence consecutive to or concurrent with other sentences, without regard to the original judgment




Hearings Held after Expiration

- G.S.15A-1344(f) grants jurisdiction to hear a probation violation hearing after expiration
- 2008 amendments:
 - "Court may extend, modify, or revoke"
 - Finding of State's "reasonable efforts" to notify the defendant and hold the hearing earlier NO LONGER REQUIRED
- Effective for hearings held after Dec. 1, 2008

UNC

Tolling for New Charges

 A new charge for an offense other than a Class 3 misdemeanor automatically tolls probation



Credit Rules

- When you activate a sentence, credit:
 - Pretrial confinement
 - Time jailed awaiting revocation hearing
 - Time served under active portion of split
 - Time spent at DART-Cherry
 - Time spent imprisoned for contempt under G.S. 15A-1344(e1)
- No credit for home detention under EHA
