COMMON LAW DUTY TO SOUND HORN IN PASSING. 1

The law 2 requires the operator of a vehicle to sound $_{his}$ horn when overtaking and passing another vehicle if, under the same or similar circumstances, a reasonably careful and prudent operator would have done so.

(The operator must sound his horn in a timely manner, that is, the operator must sound his horn in reasonable time to afford the operator ahead an opportunity to avoid injury or damage. 3)

Thus, when one overtakes and attempts to pass a vehicle traveling in the same direction, without (timely) sounding the horn when a reasonably careful and prudent operator under the same or similar circumstances would have done so, such failure would be negligence.⁴
