

# ETHICS FOR LOCAL ELECTED OFFICIALS

North Carolina law requires the governing board members of cities and counties to receive ethics training within 12 months after each election or re-election to office. Some common questions asked by elected officials are:

- ? Can I accept gifts under \$25?
- ? Can I vote to award a contract to a company owned by a family member?
- ? Can I recuse myself from voting to avoid the appearance of impropriety?
