Judicial Branch COVID-19 Task Force

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- - The Honorable F. Donald Bridges, Senior Resident Superior Court Judge, Co-Chair
 - The Honorable J.H. Corpening, II, Chief District Court Judge, Co-Chair
 - Superior court judges, district court judges, district attorneys, public defenders, clerks, magistrates, court managers (incl. Kellie Myers), and private bar (civil and criminal)
- 8 meetings between May 1 and June 24, 2020
- Chief Justice Cheri Beasley appointed in late April
 3 working groups (incl. non-Task Force members):
 - Best Safety Practices: Make recommendations about best safety practices that are evidence-based and appropriate for the courts
 - Technology and Innovations: Examine types of proceedings that can be conducted remotely, additional equipment needs, and innovations in court scheduling and operations
 - Virus Fatigue: Identify ways for Judicial Branch to support staff working with the public, and create materials and resources for front-line personnel



COVID-19 TASK FORCE RECOMMENDATIONS

- Two primary reports submitted to Chief Justice on June 12 and June 30, 2020:
 - Case management priorities as courts phased back to full operations
 - Resumption of civil and criminal jury trials
 - Best safety practices in courts generally and with respect to jury trials specifically
 - Technology and court innovations
 - Combatting virus fatigue in the courts
- Recommendations informed some of the Chief Justice's Emergency Directives (EDs), particularly those related to jury trials

CHIEF JUSTICE'S COVID-19 EDS

- G.S. 7A-39(b)(2):
 - $Chief \ Justice's \ authority \ to \ issue \ EDs \ to \ ensure \ continuing \ operation \ of \ essential \ court \ functions \ when \ catastrophic \ conditions \ exist$
 - EDs expire every 30 days, but may be extended in whole or in part
 - Authority has typically been exercised in specific counties in response to hurricanes
- Chief Justice Beasley entered first ED on March 13, 2020
- Since then, she has entered 22 different EDs, with 16 of them still in effect (and set to expire on November 14, 2020)
 - ED 6, which allowed for electronic service, expired on September 30, 2020
 - Effective October 1, S.L. 2020-46 amended Rules 3 and 5 of the NC Rules of Civil Procedure to allow for electronic filing and service



COVID-19 NON-JURY TRIAL EDS (STILL IN EFFECT)

- ED 2 Clerks to post COVID notices at all facility entrances
- ED 3 Authorizes remote proceedings
- ED 4 Restricts courthouse access to those with business to conduct in facility
- ED 5 Allows documents to be filed and statements to be sworn without a notary
- ED 8 Magistrates to continue to perform marriage ceremonies
- Judicial officials to ensure compliance with social distancing and other public • ED 9 health guidance
- ED 11 All senior residents to designate COVID-19 Facility Coordinators
- ED 12

		face coverings for all participants responding to positive tests or known exposures during trial

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Day-to-day Operations of the Courts During COVID-19




- District and superior court judges have authority to promulgate rules to promote effective administration of justice, but Chief Justice's EDs set minimum floor for health and safety requirements for operation of the courts
- 100 counties and 48 superior court districts, so lots of variability
- By statute, counties are responsible for provision and maintenance of court facilities

Statewide Filings and Dispositions





- Courtroom decorum "All Rise!"
- All applicable laws, local rules, and rules of civil and criminal procedure apply
- Recording is done by the court as determined by the NC General Statutes – You are prohibited from recording or duplicating any audio or visual image of the proceeding without the permission of the court



Transition To ecourts

- For the past 30 years, the NC court system has relied on siloed legacy systems that were developed in-house
- In 2018, NCAOC began working with the National Center for State Courts to develop a Request for Proposals for an Integrated Case Management System (ICMS)
- Integrated Lase Management System (LAMS)
 On June 7, 2019, NCAOC entered into a contract with Tyler
 Technologies for Odyssey (ICMS)

 Subsequent contracts / amendments for
 e Citation replacement (Brazos)
 NCAWARE replacement (EWarrants for law
 enforcement and Odyssey NCAWARE for clerks and
 magistrates)



ECOURTS TENTATIVE TIMELINE

HIGHLIGHTS OF ODYSSEY (ICMS) CONTRACT

- Case management and eFiling for all case types
- Software hosting in the cloud; NCAOC mainframe to be retired
- Configuration of system to meet NC's specific needs over approximately 21 months (started in June 2019 and is ongoing now)
- Configuration and statewide rollout will take approximately 5 years (contract is for 10 years)
- Total of 12 tracks / phases for statewide rollout between June 2021 and June 2024
 "Big bang" rollouts of all case types at the same time
- NOTE: NC Rules Commission is making all necessary amendments to NC Rules of Civil
 Procedure and Rules of Practice (e.g., to allow for electronic filing and service)

Odyssey (ICMS) Pilot & Early Adopter Counties



12 Odyssey (ICMS) Tracks / Phases



- Initial rollout planned in pilot counties in June 2021, followed by early adopter county in spring of 2022
 About 10 new counties will be rolled out every 3-4 months thereafter through June 2024

 - o Internally on 8/24/2020
 - To the bar and public on 8/31/2020
- Prime example of access to justice fueled by technology
- Print completed forms ready for filing
- Precursor to eFiling: Guide & Print will become Guide & File as counties go live with Odyssey

- Self-help resource for North Carolinians Attorneys and non-attorneys
- Free and convenient interactive online tool
- Step-by-step interviews developed by licensed attorneys who practice in the relevant areas
- Provides information about next steps for litigants
- Immediate benefit to court staff
- Reduced time answering questions
- Manages expectations about legal information vs. legal advice
- o Printed forms are complete, legible, and ready to file
- Reduced foot traffic in the courthouse if filing is accomplished in one visit
