School System Fund Balances – Discussion Items

- Would it be appropriate to use "should" instead of "shall" in the <u>Draft Legislation to</u>
 Address Discussion on School Board Fund Balance?
 - The General Assembly's bill drafters won't allow "should" they will change it to "shall."
- What happens if the parties don't meet?
 - Nothing official happens. But if there is a later dispute over the fund balance, there will be a record of this.
- Setting specific percentages is not feasible because of the diversity of needs of the different school systems (e.g., floods on the coast, snowstorms in the mountains).
 - Arguably, there's never been a time when there has been so much demographic, geographic, and economic diversity among North Carolina's school systems.
- Flexibility is important, but not the flexibility to do nothing.

School System Capital Balances – Discussion Items

- Joint capital planning is easier than operations planning because the former does not depend on other fund sources – capital funds are coming from local sources.
 - However, like with fund balances, this is case where one size does not fit all.
 Some school systems are growing and need new buildings. Others are shrinking and need to maintain what they have with limited resources.
 - At the last working group meeting, six different people talked about capital balances in their home counties, and there were six different approaches.
- School systems should offer commissioners the ability to (perhaps encourage them to) tour local schools. This has been a valuable practice that has led to better collaboration between school boards and commissioner boards in some districts.
- The amount of time allowed for evidence to be presented in a dispute obviously has cost implications need to strike a reasonable balance.

- Proposed approach: Add a Section 3 to the <u>Draft Legislation to Address Discussion on School Board Fund Balance</u> and populated it with language already drafted in Item 2 from <u>Discussion Items</u> for Resolution of Capital Funding.
- There was an extended discussion of feasibility and suitability of bench trials versus jury trials.
 - On the one hand, in the case of the former, the parties would know that if they
 don't work out their dispute, what would follow is a fairly accelerated bench trial
 that may focus their attention.
 - Conversely, the prospect of handing the dispute over to a jury who may do something unexpected could also provide a strong incentive to settle disagreements in advance of a trial.
 - o Either way, the decision would be appealable.
